Where new successes and new fortunes are being built by the youth and ambition of the East—in agriculture, in manufacturing, in lumbering, in shipping, in mining, in oil, in merchandising and in every related business and profession that belongs to the great development of a country growing five times as fast as the nation.

"But," some one says, "I don't want my whole life changed. I am fairly happy and contented now. I would like to see this wonderful country but I wouldn't care to become attached to it."

Immunity to the spell of the West—of The American Wonderland? We can't promise it. Some do manage, somehow, to come back, to postpone complete capitulation and remain happy for a time.
