

Airbus A300B and the Rise of Mass Tourism

The volume of air traffic increased drastically over the past 50 years as a result of globalization and mass tourism. In Germany, the number of passengers traveling to international destinations rose to a record high of 78.9 million in 2013. Worldwide, seven million people travel by air daily and this number is expected to increase to 44 million by 2050. Air travel has a significant impact on climate change: emissions released in the upper atmospheric layers are three times more harmful than the same emissions in lower layers. Although airplanes are becoming more energy efficient, this trend cannot be stopped. Engineers are working on completely new types of airplanes that will be more environmentally friendly and require fewer resources; they will integrate hybrid engines and materials such as light carbon nanotubes. However, while aeronautics experts are confident that these designs are viable, our children's children will probably be the first to actually see them in use.
