Shot clandestinely in China, under difficult conditions, this is a deep-access account of what both China and the international retail companies don't want us to see—how the clothes we buy are actually made. China Blue takes us inside a blue-jeans factory, where two teenage girls, Jasmine and Orchid, are trying to survive the harsh working environment.
