***The End of Poverty?***

Global poverty is not an accident and did not just happen. It began with military conquest, slavery and colonization that resulted in the seizure of land, minerals and forced labor. Today, global poverty has reached new levels because of unfair debt, trade and tax policies—in other words, wealthy countries exploiting the weaknesses of poor, developing countries. This film explains how today's financial crisis is a direct consequence of these unchallenged policies that have lasted centuries. Consider that 20 percent of the planet's population uses 80 percent of its resources and consumes 30 percent more than the planet can regenerate. At this rate, to maintain our lifestyle means more and more people will sink below the poverty line. Filmed in the slums of Africa and the *barrios* of Latin America, *The End of Poverty?* features expert insights from Nobel prize winners, acclaimed authors, university professors, government ministers and leaders of social movements in Brazil, Venezuela, Kenya and Tanzania.
