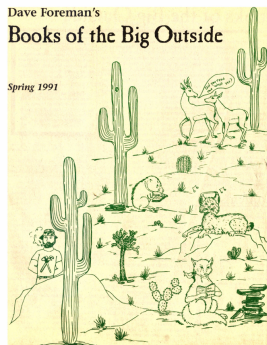

Dave Foreman's Books of the Big Outside is a catalog of books, poetry, music, and material pertaining to what he calls the “Big Outside,” compiled for “wilderness defenders.” Foreman uses the “Big Outside” as a metaphor for nature and the loneliness it brings, where wisdom can be acquired. This catalog lists books, music, poetry and other material produced by individuals “who are able to eloquently articulate the wisdom from the wild, or to draw profound lessons from human history and that are in harmony with that wisdom.”

Wisdom is more likely to be encountered listening to goose music, to the wind in the trees, or to the flow of a river than in books or libraries.
