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Critical geographer Elspeth Oppermann worked on the UK-ESRC-funded Cool Infrastructures project, which brought her to the Rachel Carson Center (RCC) as a senior research fellow in 2020. Elspeth currently works on a transdisciplinary pilot project on heat and undernutrition, based at the International Institute for Environment and Development (IIED), and funded by the

Wellcome Trust, the Volkswagen Foundation, and NovoNordisk.
