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Late in the 20th century, the Monsanto Corporation advanced plant evolution into the novel GMO phasea being virtually identical to a plant-known as a *Replicant* or genetically modified organism (GMO). The novel Replicants were superior in strength and pesticides, and at least equal in intelligence, to the genetic engineers who



created them. *Replicants* were grown on American soil as industrial food and *farmaceuticals* in the hazardous conditions caused by global climate change.

> After these novel organisms were found to create genetic pollution, killing off species like the monarch butterfly, *Replicant* GMO's were declared illegal on Earth-except in America where they are still grown. Special Earth First! activists-*Blade Runner Units*-rose up from the *pharms* and cities, and destroyed, upon detection, invader GMO crops. This was not called sabotage. It was called product recall. -Red Gate Earth First!

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CAN THE SYSTEM BE ABOLISHED?

As a new century unfolds, the activist movement is faced with a most important and crucial revolution-the self-revolution. This revolution is critical in the fight against the abolishment of the mega-machine. For our fight to be successful in changing the system in which we live, we must understand ourselves. Why is it that we (activists) have a common struggle, yet we don't have a common solidarity? If solidarity within our movement is not present, then we must not continue to move forward until we address why it's absent. Our movement is so stuck in specific ideas and is not willing to see the importance of other movements which have different tactics. How are we to change anything if we can't even change ourselves?

It's crucial that we share our visions with one another to break down some of the barriers caused by misunderstanding and splinterism. For example, take the movement around biocentrism: Even though this movement is important, it excludes the social and cultural movements. The cultural and social movements care about biocentrisim issues, but they don't have the luxury to work on ecological problems, their main worry is surviving the system. Due to the different ways we view our struggle, we have developed barriers to working together. If we start analyzing movements, we can clearly see how interrelated they are. Ecological, social and cultural movements need to work together not because the fight is too big for one group to take on, but because the fight is related.

Recently a massacre occurred in the desert near Yuma, Arizona, where more than 20 human beings died of thirst while trying to cross the US border. Yet many activists view this as an overpopulation or immigration issue and not an ecological one. In reality it is a broader global problem. People are crossing the border simply because their homes—ecological and social have been destroyed for corporate gain. Finding it impossible to survive, their only solution is to move elsewhere. And *still* the movement is split on this



issue. How can this be? If we continue to split our work like this, then our goals will never be met.

We all have an obligation-a sacred responsibility-to act in a manner that reflects our common needs and not our uncommon differences. We need to develop, through education at all levels of society, a global consciousness that will govern our actions as responsible planet stewards and future ancestors. Acrimony among potential allies leads only to further disagreement, not solutions. Just as the purveyor of globalization diversifies the tactics of globalization, the environmental movement needs to replace strident rhetoric with direct actions. The futureor the lack thereof-belongs to everyone. -GEORGETTE

pressed make a beeline for the food. If these nectar collectors remain impressed they will join in the dance, so that over time many bees in the hive will be singing the same song and dancing the same dance and the food source will be heavily used.

Potential pitfalls to this system are not problems for these bees. Because they are sensitive to the plane of polarized light, they can determine sun position even on overcast days, and if inclement weather or nightfall delays return to a food source, dances later compensate for the change in sun position. The refined communicative provess of honeybees, their ability to convert gravitational information in the dark hive into visual information in the world, is unrivaled among all living beings.

Superiority is an annoying concept put forth by the human species to justify wanton destruction of other species and habitats. If this concept is applied here, then the rudimentary development of the human organism is illuminated yet again. Honeybees are clearly superior to humans.

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Fauna. *n.* animal life. Cabala. *n.* an esoteric, secret matter or mysterious art.

Honeybees (*Apis melifera*) give precise directions while they sing and dance for a trembling crowd in the dark. After finding a particularly inspiring food source, a nectar-laden bee flies back to the hive where, on the vertical surface of the comb, she dances. Usually this is in the shape of a figure eight and is called the waggle dance.

The angle that the figure eight departs from the vertical conveys which direction the food is from the hive. It's the same angle as between the sun and the food, from the hive. For instance, if she dances straight upward, the food is directly toward the sun, straight downward, it's directly away from the sun and 45 degrees to the right means it is 45 degrees to the right of the sun.

She communicates distance in addition to direction by speed. The faster she dances, the closer the food source.

As she waggles, a gaggle of her nestmates observes, but because it's dark in the hive they do this via sound. Her song enables bees to first find her amongst the masses and then to interpret the angle of her dance. They can do this because their hearing organs, in antennae, can be moved to and fro to decipher her coming and going in relation to their position and gravity.

Meanwhile, her audience members employ a signal that does not compete with hers: They vibrate the comb with their thoraxes. When there's a whole lot of shaking going on, she stops to pass out tidbits from the food source. Those who are suitably im-

GENETICISTS FEEL THE HEAT

The Earth Liberation Front (ELF) has claimed responsibility for two separate actions on May 21 targeting the genetic manipulation of trees. According to a communiqué released on June 1, one ELF group burned down the office of Toby Bradshaw, head of the Poplar Molecular Genetics Cooperative (PMGC) at the University of Washington (UW) in Seattle. Simultaneously, another group burned an office and a fleet of 13 trucks at Jefferson Poplar Farms in Clatskanie, Oregon.

The combined estimated total in damages has soared to more than \$3 million, Bradshaw lost 20 years of research articles, slides, memorabilia, a computer, the server for the PMGC website and a personal library. This incident marks the first time in North America that the ELF has targeted two separate locations in differing states on the same night.

Bradshaw claims that he doesn't personally engineer mutant genes into trees and that his research on poplars used at industrial tree farms is good for the environment. However, the ELF asserts that "hybrid poplars are an ecological nightmare threatening native biodiversity in the ecosystem. Our forests are being liquidated and replaced with monocultured tree farms so greedy, Earth-raping corporations can make more money." IN THE END GENETICISTS WERE CREDITED WITH "PRESERVING" THE LAST



According to an article published by the PMGC, "As intensive culture of *Populus* and its hybrids becomes increasingly important as a source of fiber and fuel, breeding strategies must be developed and implemented to measure, capture, recombine and fully exploit the abundant genetic variation still found in natural populations of poplars and cottonwoods. Domestication of poplars and their hybrids, to better adapt them to the specialized needs of industry, is still in its earliest stages and must take advantage of the best genetic methods available if rapid, sustained genetic improvement is to be made."

Furthermore, Bradshaw's research program includes transgenic poplar trees grown indoors at a greenhouse next to the torched office building at UW, as well as outdoor sites. The core of this "genome" program involves conducting baseline research into the genetic mapping of the poplars and improving the trees' "hardiness and productivity." This is an essential, preliminary step in the process of genetic engineering: A species must have its genome mapped before it can be effectively manipulated and exploited for corporate profit.

Members of PMGC include Alberta Pacific Forest Industries, British Columbia Ministry of Forests, Boise Cascade, Champion, Fort James, Georgia Pacific, Inland Empire Paper Company, Electric Power Research Institute, MacMillan Bloedel, Potlatch, Scott Paper Ltd., Union Camp, US Department of Energy, Westvaco and Weyerhaeuser. In addition, the PMGC is a member of and works closely with the Tree Genetic Engineering Research Program, whose members include the above entities as well as Monsanto, Shell, International Paper, Broadacres Nursery, Canadian Forest Service, Mt. Jefferson Farms, Mycogen, US Forest Service and Washington State University.

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Mount Graham is an island of forest in a sea of desert. By Evelyn Horne and Roger Beatty

For 15 years the University of Arizona (UA) has been an outlaw. Bumbling along while trashing environmental laws and trampling human rights, it has been able to accomplish its environmental and cultural jihad only with the help of congressional crooks and dim-witted judges.

Recently, the UA decided that it needed a powerline to fuel the Columbus Project, a massive telescope built on the formerly pristine Emerald Peak of Mount Graham. This corporation, posing as a university, chose to scrape a powerline corridor through the second largest national forest roadless area in Arizona, across land held sacred by traditional Western Apaches. The Mount Graham Coalition, Apaches for Cultural Preservation and Apache Survival Coalition filed a lawsuit in the District Court of Arizona to stop this project.

Originally assigned to be heard before Judge Zapata, the plaintiffs expected a fair hearing. Unfortunately, Judge Alfredo Marquez had retained jurisdiction over this case and came out of retirement. Marquez, long a friend of the UA (he has free tickets to UA football games), Page 6 Earth First! Litha 2001

was there to make sure the university's interests were protected. Once again, Marquez ruled in favor of corporate interest.

If nothing else, the recent Mount Graham federal district court decision that allows a 23-mile powerline to rip through irreplaceable sacred land and critical habitat brings us ever closer to properly pronouncing the antiquated legal term res judicata. It rhymes with "raced you to ca-ca." Fitting, since that's exactly what the district judge, the UA and the Forest Service did in this case. In an ongoing frantic scramble around cultural, religious and environmen-

tal protection laws, the so-called interpreter and guardian of these laws shirked his duties to apply a judgemade law and avoid judging the case on its merits.

The doctrine of *res judicata* is misapplied in this case. When correctly applied, it is a fabulous judicial resource-saving device that bars repeat litigation. More commonly known as "claim preclusion," *res* *judicata* is the "one bite at the apple" rule. A claimant only gets to sue on the same claim once and must ask for all the rights to relief properly encompassed in that claim. Otherwise, when the claimant brings a second claim, the judgment in the first case may stop that claimant from litigating the second case. To satisfy *res judicata*, the same plaintiff must sue the same defendant, and the claims must be identical. Neither element is met in this case.

First, the judge neglected to consider that the Apaches for Cultural Preservation were not plaintiffs in the earlier case. So, applying res judicata violates their constitutional right of due process. Also, Marquez used enormous discretion in deciding that the earlier claim encompassed the powerline controversy. The UA prevailed on that claim only after spending millions of dollars convincing Congress that they needed an exemption from environmental laws to disturb 8.6 acres for three telescopes supported by a generator. The exemption, granted in 1988, said nothing about a powerline that would make its own distinctive mark across the mountain, well outside the 8.6-acre congressionally approved limit. More-

over, the '88 exemption was only an exemption from environmental protection laws. For these reasons and because of another judge-made legal doctrine called "justiciability," the issues regarding the powerline and the National Historic Preservation Act were never litigated. Justiciability requires that a controversy be "ripe" for resolution. A lawyer may not litigate a dispute based on mere speculation. Judges need to see the actual blood and guts of a matter before correctly ruling on it. So it is no wonder that, during the earlier lawsuit to stop three telescopes, environmental lawyers never litigated a powerline issue. According to the UA administrator's list of operational support requirements, there was no powerline issue because there was no powerline.

Just in case the judge's most recent bias was lost on any of us or on the Apache elders who made the long, hot road trip from the reservation to the federal building that day, he further flexed his insensitive discretionary muscle to hold that laches—a legal term indicating that plaintiffs waited too long to bring a complaint to court-applied to the claim. Now, there is no brightline rule for when a claimant has excessively delayed in bringing a claim. But in his second deferential gesture to his cronies, the judge declared that six months was just too long to wait to bring a case. It matters not that Mount Graham's legal defenders work without the cushy

resources that the federal government and UA enjoy when preparing a case. What matters, apparently, is this judge's sick desire to leave the Apache elders feeling that their only recourse is to sit down in front of the powerline construction and play a nice long game of cards.

Though that sounds fun and effective, they will also appeal this terrible legal decision. Hopefully this time we'll catch the UA with its pants down, though the Apache elders may not want to see it. After all, they're subject to the university's ongoing public exposure,



as the telescopic erections protrude from the side of the mountain that faces their reservation. It's not a pretty sight.

Saboteurs Hit Powerline Construction Site

An unknown person or persons attacked the construction site of the 23-mile powerline to the University of Arizona's Mount Graham International Observatory (MGIO) late on the night of April 21. Using sledgehammers and crowbars, the saboteurs caused \$200,000 in damages to the powerline, construction vehicles and equipment. MGIO talking head Joe Carter said that "vandals" cut the exposed powerline in several places and put abrasives into the oil and gasoline tanks of several pieces of excavation machinery. "Most of the damage is to the vehicles," he said.

"I think this is an example of eco-terrorism," Carter said. "It's most unfortunate that folks don't use the courts to resolve problems but take things into their own hands"—an ironic statement, considering Judge Marquez's subsequent ruling in favor of the powerline project.

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Klamath River Showdown

In a precedent-setting decision, a federal judge ruled that "the Endangered Species Act clearly gives threatened and endangered fish the highest priority during this drought." The judge refused to grant an injunction that would have allowed the limited available water to be used for crop irrigation. But the battle continues as the Bureau of Reclamation drags its feet on releasing water to the Lower Klamath National Wildlife Refuge. The drought, greedy farmers and lackey bureaucrats are putting at risk nearly 1,000 bald eagles that winter in the refuge. The Upper and Lower Klamath National Wildlife Refuges support three-fourths of the Pacific Flyway's waterfowl and marshes in the refuges will have little or no water by this fall.

Maine Fears Ecoterrorism

"This bill establishes the crime of environmental terrorizing, which is the destruction of property or the interference with a place of business' normal course of business by individuals or groups for the primary purpose of protesting a natural resource or environmental issue," so reads the summary of a bill sponsored by a forest industry stooge, Rep. Joe Clark (D-Millinocket). Apparently the fear of protests is so great in Maine that the First, Fifth and Fourteenth Amendments to the US Constitution are no longer relevant. Under this new law people staging a sit-in at any business could be charged with a Class C felony. Convictions of Class C crimes often receive more than nine-month sentences which must be served in state prisons, not county jails.

"I think the bill is ridiculous," said Jim Freeman, who has been arrested many times for non-violent actions. "It's a corporate bill to prevent people from protesting." Others believe that the bill will encourage people to go underground since First Amendment protests could now result in felonies. NEWYORK Regjonal Rendezvous

In the belly of the beast, New York City (NYC), a handful of folks organized the first ever Earth First! regional rendezvous in an urban center to focus on radical ecology and urban living. Though many don't admit it, they spend a great deal of time outside of the forest and in large cities. This gathering was an attempt to highlight rampant environmental racism, failures of urban planning and to bring disparate communities together, bioregionally, to further radicalize both young white activists and people of color in the communities that feel the brunt of the urban environmental blight. The gathering

was organized to take people around the city to see its green spaces, hold workshops and celebrate public space.

The gathering began in the Green Dome Garden, a community garden in Brooklyn. Just a block away, a demolished paint factory has deposited lead content in the soil 10 times the legal limit. Luckily for this predominately Puerto Rican community, the gardeners were not slow in taking action. They chose plants that help to trap lead and other toxins. After a composting workshop, the EF! crew moved to the East Riverfront where a row of abandoned warehouses and derelict piers have rewilded into a stretch of free space. A do-it-yourself rubble-constructed skate park is amid the husks of torched cars and covert shanties. A snapping turtle slowly cruised by without altercation. During the evening in Brooklyn, we went to Eco Books for workshops on the animal liberation campaign against



Huntingdon Life Sciences, Car Busters' call for a car-free city and Rainforest Relief's direct action campaign to stop the use of tropical rainforest hardwoods in the city's benches, boardwalks and bridges. Late that night, we cruised through the Jamaica Bay Wildlife Refuge by the subway, emerging on Far Rockaway beach for a bonfire and camping out on the edge of the city, unmolested.

Next was a day in the Project Harmony garden in Harlem, as well as a tour of green spaces and creeping gentrification. In a short walk we saw 11 empty buildings on the same streets as four bulldozed gardens. When the bulldozers came for Project Harmony, a brave soul climbed a tall tree and stopped the destruction for the day. Now a court order protects the remaining 500 gardens, but the stay of execution could be lifted at any time.

These gardens are living proof of a community empowering itself to take back its land from landlord arson, drug dealing, refuse and city neglect to create safe green spaces for children, elderly people and those who can't afford summer homes nor vacations outside the city smog.

We held a workshop on environmental racism in the prison industrial complex. The issues of prisons and the environment don't often come up together, but increased prison construction and privatization is uniting these struggles. Some people have tried to use environmental laws as a way to fight prison building. The impacts of instantly transplanting 2,000-plus people, with increased sewage and waste disposal, are disastrous. The prisons are often built over smaller productive farmlands or wildlands, destroying food, habitat and watersheds.

Who is in jail? Predominately people of color. Almost everyone in the neighborhood was impacted in some way by the prison industrial complex. Haja, cofounder of Project Harmony, spent some time in prison and was politicized inside: "A prison is a microcosm of the larger society." Later in the evening we breached the fence surrounding the half of Project Harmony that was destroyed and began replanting it with donated plants and seeds. After this, we joined a moonlight critical mass through Central Park to end a beautiful day uptown.

On our agenda for the next day was the Lower East Side of Manhattan, mecca for the gardening movement as well as tenant and anarchist organizing in NYC. We began the morning in the Stannard Diggs, a threatened community garden, with a history of the More Gardens! Coalition and their direct action campaigns to protect and actively create new community gardens. A workshop was organized on how to deal with grand juries, due to the intense and scattershot repression in Long Island following a series of Earth Liberation Front actions.

Bob Lederer, an anti-racist and ACT-UP activist, led the discussion charting the history of activist resistance to the grand jury, beginning with the Puerto Rican liberation struggle in the 1930s through the dark days of Nixon, to his own sentencing of two and a half months during investigations into the Black Liberation Army. He argued that cooperating with the police on any level is dangerous.

Canada Wages Chemical Warfare

The Royal Canadian Mounted Police admit using more than 3,000 canisters of tear gas and more than 500 plastic bullets in their attempt to keep protesters away from the Summit of the Americas Conference in April. Quebec provincial police have already reported their use of 1,700 tear gas canisters and 320 rubber bullets. Police used so much tear gas that they had to order more from the US.

A Quebec government-appointed panel stated in early May that police used "abusive" amounts of tear gas and placed protesters at serious risk by shooting them with rubber bullets. At the peak of the protest the Canadian Broadcast Corporation reports that as many as 30 canisters of tear gas were fired each minute. More than 400 protesters were arrested at the summit and scores were injured.

Utah's Government Fights Crickets and Environmentalists

"Sooner or later we've got to decide whether we are going to live here or give in to the environmentalists," said Representative Jim Gowans (D-Tooele). Officials hope to start spreading pesticide-tainted grain on more than 3.000-acres of the Uinta National Forest to combat the summer invasion of Mormon crickets that damage crops. The Utah Environmental Congress is threatening to sue the Forest Service to stop the program. The group says that the insecticide carbaryl is a documented carcinogen that could harm threatened bald eagles and other sensitive wildlife species. such as sage grouse and wild turkey.

The Forest Service claims they have studied the chemicals and that there is no problem, but US Fish and Wildlife officials stated in a letter to the District Ranger William Ott, "We have concerns that the practices developed using the science of 14-years ago may not be in accordance with present-day knowledge."

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INDIANA'S FIRST TREESIT IN ITS THIRD MONTH

"Bluebird," Indiana's first treesit is going into its third month. On March 22, Tracy "Dolphin" McNeely ascended 50 feet to a platform in a 70-year-old red oak in an area slated for destruction by a non-local developer for housing units. This 54-acre wooded site is one of Bloomington's last greenspaces left on the west side of town. With the adjoining properties the total woodlot is 180 acres—which when preserved will be a jewel for the residents of Bloomington who have seen woodlot after woodlot and field after field developed into strip malls, industrial parks and those oh-so-needed fast food outlets. Bloomington residents, progressive by midwestern standards, have been extraordinarily supportive in the efforts to stop this development and permanently protect the area. This is the goal of Buffalo Trace Earth First!

The woods where the development is proposed are in a very fragile karst (porous limestone) area of rolling hills and steep terrain that is dotted with sinkholes, natural springs and caves. This area is home to several endangered plants and a host of wildflowers, wildlife, important underground caves and waterways that provide habitat for environmentally sensitive cavedwelling species such as the blind crayfish and cave salamander.

Herman Associates, an Indianapolis development corporation, received \$10 million in tax-exempt bonds and \$4.2 million in tax credits to build in this sensitive area. Clearly, this is another case of corporate welfare.

Unlike many treesits, Bluebird is located in town just behind two large housing developments. As a result of the close proximity to Bloomington, the support from the community and the large number of visitors has been tremendous. Local musicians have serenaded the treesitter with trumpets, fiddles and guitars. Nearby schools have brought classes out to visit, and a group of grade school students even helped with the banner. Tim Ream stopped to chat while in town with the *Pickaxe* roadshow. This Buffalo Trace Earth First! action took on a very different feel than what we had expected.

Media attention has waned and the number of visitors has dropped but that allows us to prepare for the upcoming fight to save this unique area. Thanks to Karen Pickett and the EF! Direct Action Fund, we are able to continue this campaign.

On June 12, there will be one last opportunity for the Bloomington Council to deny the release of the bonds to Herman Associates. We invite all activists to join us to defend this beautiful place. Just ask anyone in town where the treesit is, as "treesit" is now a household phrase in Bloomington. In fact you may get the question returned, "which one?" Indiana's second treesit happened just eight days after the first and continues to be successful in stopping a timber sale in Yellowwood State Forest.

Ambrose's Hearing Postponed Again

In January, Frank Ambrose was arrested and charged with felony tree spiking in an Earth Liberation Front (ELF) action in the Morgan-Monroe State Forest. His pre-trial hearing was originally set for April 5, but was moved to May 15 due to "security concerns" stemming from the planned week of resistance and the ELF press office's call for a day of action. One day before Frank's May 15 pretrial hearing, his lawyer Rick Kammen was granted a continuance, as the prosecution still had not turned over any evidence from the FBI. The rationale for moving the date is that the pre-trial hearing is where the "evidence" is talked about, and it is hard to debate that point when you have not seen what the other side is planning to use against you. While this drags the process out for Frank, it does indicate some good things. Namely, the FBI and state should have had all their evidence together when they pressed charges because they may have had to show it to a judge before he would sign a warrant. If that was the case, they should have been able to immediately comply with the discovery motion filed days after Frank's arrest. Either they are intentionally holding out to drag the case on and increase the expenses and time involved in dealing with it, or they do not have any worthwhile evidence and they do not want that revealed at this time. It seems that the latter is the case, considering what the FBI has said they have.

We are asking people to call the courthouse and tell them to drop the charges against Frank. It is time they stop dancing around pretending they caught the ELF. Please be polite, as anything you say will likely come up in his trial if it gets to that point. The number for the courthouse is (812) 349-2670.

BLOOMINGTON ACTIVISTS CELEBRATE WEEK OF RESISTANCE

March 30 to April 5 was a week that Bloomington, Indiana, will not quickly forget. It was planned by the Bloomington Defense Committee (BDC), Buffalo Trace Earth First! and Bloomington Anarchist Black Cross as a week of resistance to government harassment of activists. It was a response to the government's attempt to frame activist Frank Ambrose on felony tree-spiking charges. We intended to show the federales that we would not be scared into silence and submission by arrests, accusations and frequent visits under the guise of solving the "crimes" committed by the Earth Liberation Front (ELF).

It started with a critical mass bike ride on March 30. The local police had been hyped up by the media and the FBI that a bunch of "elves" were coming to southern Indiana to "protest the arrest of one of their own," so they attacked the 80-plus riders and arrested seven of them. Two riders face felony charges of battery on a police officer for getting beat up and pepper sprayed. The other five face resisting arrest, obstructing traffic and disorderly conduct charges.

People attending the critical mass did not plan to get arrested, as we typically have a ride at the end of every month and there are never any problems. The police were obviously planning arrests as there was a very large contingent of police present from the beginning of the ride. Arrests and violence were the tactic police used to try to scare people away from attending the rest of the week's events.

People immediately moved into prisoner solidarity mode and organized a protest at the jail. More than 100 people came out to support the assaulted bike riders. At the protest, an undercover FBI agent was spotted talking to people and was chased off with a chorus of "NaNaNaNa, Hey hey hey, goodbye." David Rovics was in town and moved his concert to the jail to provide entertainment to the crowd and to show his solidarity with the riders. The vigil was kept all night as the two charged with felonies were not released immediately on their own recognizance.

On March 31, the media carried photos of our fellow activists being beaten in the streets. We worried that these pictures would scare people away, as the police actions were clearly intended to do, but more than 100 people were not afraid and came out to march in the streets against free-trade. The police were no where to be found even though the group blocked the street with the march. We think it was the pictures on the front page of the paper and the threats of civil rights lawsuits that dissuaded the police from any further violent action.

To kick up the intensity of the week, Buffalo Trace Earth First! activists Marie Mason and Cogi Haggerty locked their necks to a junk car blocking the entrance to a brand new Old Navy store. Soon after the lockdown was deployed,

a support rally of around 50 showed up and started to get the word out (read: bullhorn in store along with lots of fliers) on why these people were blocking the front doors. People were very receptive to the idea of boycotting Old Navy for their use of sweatshop labor and logging of Redwood forests. After a few tense moments when the owner of the shopping center threatened to tow the car away with protesters attached, the police and fire department arrived and proceeded to cut the two out. After they were removed, the police decided not to arrest them. Later, a friendly person who had lingered around after the protest observed the police make the store owner pay \$60 to tow the junked car away.

The announcement of a new treesit in Yellowwood State Forest was made on April 1. This was the second treesit to go airborn in the Bloomington area in less than a month. The tract has such extremely steep slopes that almost every tree in the sale is on a grade too steep to log according the Department of Natural Resources guidelines.

On April 2-5, the focus was on working to educate the public about why people are concerned with what is happening to our planet and to its inhabitants. Some of the highlights included an anti-corporate march, a protest against privatization of water services, a rally in support of the Yellowwood treesit and against logging on our public lands and a protest against government harassment. When we went to protest against logging on public lands, we found the target office closed for the day and the timber sale bid scheduled for the following day canceled. Every evening included a forum on issues affecting our community and the Earth. These included: global forest issues, patriarchy and government harassment. The forum about patriarchy in the movement was the most attended and most sorely needed forum, as it is an issue that is too often overlooked.

All in all, the week was a great success. People started to work together again after months of infighting and disagreement about what role to take in the government's investigation of the ELF. A new treesit was set up and supplied, the existing Bluebird treesit was reinforced with more people and supplies, people showed a willingness to take their actions to a new level and that they would not be intimidated by the cops. This week will hopefully springboard a successful summer of direct action against those who profit from the destruction of the Earth and human race in Bloomington.

The Bloomington Defense Committee will continue with support for the critical mass riders and Frank Ambrose. These folks will need all the support they can get to beat the charges the state has leveled against them. 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THE BATTLE CONTINUED AT BIG MOUNTAIN

When the US Supreme Court refused to hear an appeal on the case of Jenny Manybeads vs. United States, Navajos facing forced eviction from their traditional lands appealed to the United Nations in April.

Kee Watchman of the Cactus Valley community, told the UN Human Rights Commission in Geneva that Navajos in Arizona have suffered for 30 years, enduring constant harassment and threats because the energy industry seeks Navajo coal. As a representative of the International Indian Treaty Council, Watchman requested an international tribunal to hold the US and its officials accountable for their actions.

"The United States government, for reasons of its own policy, is actively and knowingly destroying our families, our livelihood and our sacred places," for the "rich and low-sulfur coal that lies beneath our feet." Peabody Coal, the world's largest energy consortium, has been trying to mine North America's largest reserve of low sulfur coal on reservation land for years.

Additionally, in his address on religious intolerance, Watchman said deep injury will result if the Hopi proceed with a plan to construct a cellular tower on a peak over Big Mountain without consultation with Navajos living there.

Cedric Kuwaninvaya, chairman of the Hopi Land Team, said the US Supreme Court decision means time has run out for Navajos who refused to sign 75-year lease accommodation agreements with the tribe. "Denial of the Manybeads appeal makes imminent the eviction of Navajo individuals on the Hopi Partitioned Land (HPL) without a lease agreement with the Hopi tribe," stated Kuwaninvaya.

After the US Supreme Court refused to hear the appeal, Navajo President Kelsey Begaye extended his sympathy to Navajo families living on HPL. Begaye said the decision was hard to accept, but families have fought valiantly to preserve Diné (Navajo) sacred ways. Meanwhile, at Big Mountain, Bahe Katenay said, "The people's way of life is constantly under attack. The feeling is that the American government doesn't want to hear about our culture, history and why we want to stay on the land to protect it."

US District Judge Earl Carroll lifted a 1977 injunction, which now authorizes the Hopi tribe to enforce its grazing laws—livestock permits and impoundments—on Navajos living on HPL.

Katenay and other Diné believe both court decisions are a direct result of international outcry about the coal industry's efforts to remove Navajos in order to mine the Black Mesa coal beds.

In nearby Kykotsmovi, the Hopi celebrated both court decisions as victories. After more than two decades, the Hopi re-

gained full control and jurisdiction over grazing on HPL when Judge Carroll lifted the 1977 injunction. "It is an indisputable fact that we have been second-class citizens on our own

> lands for too long," said Hopi Chairman Wayne Taylor.

> Taylor congratulated the US Supreme Court for refusing to overturn the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals ruling in Jenny Manybeads vs. US. The lawsuit was filed in 1998 by Navajos and is based on their right to practice traditional religion on sacred land. They also challenged the 1974 Navajo-Hopi Settlement Act that resulted in Navajo and Hopi partitioned lands.

> "Their action threatened to undermine Hopi sovereign authority to use and control its own lands and threatened the implementation of a settle

ment that took years of compromise between the Hopi and Navajo," Taylor said. "We want our children to put the Navajo-Hopi land dispute behind them and chart a different history of peace between both tribes."

On Black Mesa, Glenna C. Begay, who lives less than two miles from the Peabody Coal mine, said the dust in the air, water, soil and plants has made the people sick with respiratory diseases. Ancestral burial sites have been destroyed and precious water is used to "flush coal to the Mohave Generating Station in Nevada" by way of coal slurry



leaving the people with scarce supplies of water. She said it is time to close Peabody's two coal mines on Black Mesa.

The Navajo Nation defended mining leases as a means of employment and revenues, with the majority of the tribe's \$100-million annual income derived from coal, oil and gas royalties and taxes.

Eviction of Navajo families who refused to sign 75-year-leases by February 1, 2000, will proceed by court action said the US Attorney's Office in Arizona and the Hopi tribe. Navajos are to be relocated to the "New Lands" near Chambers, Arizona. This is the site of the largest nuclear waste spill in US history. Navajos who have resettled in the New Lands have experienced higher rates of cancer and birth defects than the general population.

Back at Big Mountain, Norman Benally said, "We have exhausted our strengths to protect our homelands," and he is calling for continuing international support in the three-decade long battle.

April 20 marked the three-year anniversary of direct action at the Fall Creek treesit in Oregon's Willamette National Forest. In 1998, the occupation began with a treesit named Happy and soon became a tree-village with traverse lines connecting seven treesits. Hundreds of activists have lived in the forest canopy as high as 200 feet above the forest floor. Activists have endured three winters of rain, bitter cold, cop harassment, threats, sieges, closures, raids, arrests... and still they remain. A federal court ruled that the Forest Service had failed to survey for red tree voles, an indicator species and prey for the endangered Northern spotted owl. Treesitters have worked with surveyors to find vole nests, hoping to have the sale canceled. To all of you who came out to visit, sat in a tree, delivered food or donated money, supplies and good wishes, we send thanks! The struggle is not yet over. Summer is heating up in Cascadia, take your summer school in the trees! Ground-up training available! No experience necessary. All you need is a strong will, an open heart, a cooperative spirit and a desire to end patriarchal control of Mama Earth.

Eagle Creek Blockaded, Trucks Torched

Three Years of Resistance at Fall Creek

The Eagle Creek timber sale near Mt. Hood in northern Oregon was sold to Vanport Manufacturing in 1996. When logging of critical habitat began in 1988, dozens of protesters from Portland blocked logging access and took to living in treesits and pods suspended over the logging roads. This area supplies drinking water for much of northern Oregon, has numerous rare plants and animals and has a history of serious tree blowdowns. Fears that increased logging would result in catastrophic blowdown led US Senator Wyden (D-OR) to extract a promise from the Forest Service to have an independent panel study the area.

The same week that scientists met to study the area, the Forest Service decided to send in the logging trucks. Once again the Eagle Creek Free-Staters and Cascadia Forest Alliance were there blocking access to the chainsaws. Tree pods and web structures blocked the logging road, and the initial confrontation between law enforcement and protesters became heated as the Forest Service threatened to dismantle the structures. One activist's hand was cut by a Forest Service officer.

The Clackamas County sheriffs prepared for the usual

round of summertime forest protests until they received a call at 2:40 a.m. on June 1. In Estacada, just down the mountain from the Eagle Creek blockade three logging trucks were set on fire. One truck was severely damaged with a price tag of about \$50,000. Only one of six gasolinefilled plastic milk jugs ignited or the damages would have been much more severe. The owner of the trucks, Ray Schoppert, commented that, "We've had problems with people for 20 years." Cascadia Forest Alliance says that they are not involved in property destruction. No one has claimed responsibility as the *EFIJ* goes to print.

Concrete Tree Spikes Baffle BC Loggers

On May 22, a dozen concrete tree spikes were found in downed and standing timber near Trozzo Creek in the Slocan Valley of interior British Columbia. Loggers have found metal spikes before, but nothing like these plugs made of concrete inside sections of plastic pipe. They were well concealed with patches of bark stuck over the holes. These spikes cannot be found with metal detectors. Logging protests have occurred in the area for many years and residents feel that logging should not take place in community watersheds. One conservationist in the area said, "I understand that there is a level of frustration and the situation is going to get worse."

EF! and Southeast RAGE Visit Syngenta

On May 14, Uwharrie Earth First! and Southeast RAGE (Resistance Against Genetic Engineering) joined together to take direct action against the agricultural biotechnology industry in North Carolina. The targeted company, Syngenta, is one of a handful of multinational biotech firms hiding their profit-driven motives behind an environmental and humanitarian image. More than 50 people descended upon this global corporation to quarantine the biohazardous products they are unleashing on society and the natural world. Dressed in white biohazard suits, EFI and RAGE activists exposed Syngenta as a threat to the integrity of local and sustainable food production.

Protesters spray-painted anti-biotechnology messages on the Syngenta building and outside signs. After 30 minutes the Greensboro Police swarmed the lawn and aggressively attacked the activists. Eight participants were hit with pepper spray as they planted organic corn, bean and wildflower seeds in Syngenta's front lawn. Three people were arrested for vandalism and resisting arrest. Syngenta estimated the damages at \$10,000.

After the arrests, police donned riot gear in an attempt to intimidate protesters with threats of violence. Activists stayed on the lawn for 15 more minutes and then marched away, only to be followed and harassed by the police for the remainder of the morning.

Syngenta is the world's largest agrochemical corporation, created last year with the merger of Novartis and AstraZeneca. Syngenta won its newest Terminator seed patent in November 2000.

Blue Ridge EF! Sends Staples a Message

Newly-formed Blue Ridge EF! (BREF!) staged its first action at a suburban Richmond, Virginia, Staples store on March 28. A giant banner redecorated the logo on top of the store so that it read: "STUMPS—we've got that." Amid chants of "three percent recycled, 97 percent stumps," BREF! activists and allies delivered a pile of real stumps to Staples' doorstep.

Most shoppers agreed with the call for more recycled paper, but a group of counter-protesters in lawn chairs, who called themselves the "Tree Keepers," urged Staples to continue to sell more unrecycled paper in the name structure, a picnic table fashioned from a culvert top and stumps. We decided then that we did not have the legal situation in which any of us could participate in open blockading when the courts are more than willing to lock us up for extensive amounts of time. Tactics in the sale turned to relentless cat & mouse, as well as video documentation. This seemed to frustrate the Feds, who were doing 24-hour security but were still too out of shape to apprehend any of the masked lil' warriors—though sometimes they did put forth a commendable effort.

Ultimately, the pine pigs, knowing they would have complicity in the courts, charged two activists with two counts each of interfering with logging and one received a closure violation. The following week Locust pied Helen Chenowith, and Pebbles was serving time for her probation violation. Hours later, two other activists, including Drea, were leaving the timber sale to do jail support. Dragged out of their vehicle, they were both tackled, charged with resisting arrest, held in jail and

bailed out a week later. With all the main organizers dealing with their legal situations, resistance in the field was low.

While in jail Locust, Pebbles and one other activist were charged with two counts each of aiding and abetting Drea in her blockade four months prior to their indictment.

Their trials, which entailed the usual lies and denial of justice, had some positive rulings but ended predominately as unjust as to be expected in the federal courts in Idaho. Drea plead guilty to one of her three charges to maintaining an unauthorized structure. She received four



months in jail with two suspended over two years probation, and in an even more drastic violation of rights she is banned from all national forests for that time. Locust, Pebbles and one other activist were found not guilty of all three charges stemming from the original blockade, though the federal ruling issued said we "probably, more likely than not" did it and the government did not fulfill their burden of proof.

During Drea's incarceration there was trial in Idaho federal court on the interfering with logging and violating *continued on page 52*

of the free-market economy, landowner rights and "the American way of life."

One highlight of the action occurred when an inquisitive customer asked where the paper to make the signs came from. To this, BREFI responded, "We rescued it from Staples dumpster. Staples was throwing it out."

Mattole Logging Continues

Operating on two separate logging plans, Columbia Helicopter and Lewis Logging fallers have leveled a majority of the 68 acres slated for clearcutting in Northern California's Mattole forest. The Humboldt County Sheriff's Department has barreled into the area with logging crews in tow at 4 a.m. every morning.

On several occasions, the Mattole Forest Defenders have mobilized up to 80 activist and community members to block the outside gates, yet with up to seven separate entrances, stopping this convoy of more than 20 logging vehicles has proved almost impossible.

Resistance has been strong with more than 35 arrests

since May 9. Most of those arrested have been in the backwoods at the point of destruction. These brave activists have shut down logging for periods of time in different areas by climbing trees, talking with falling crews and just being in the way. Two women were arrested May 11 who had locked down to a 55-gallon drum filled with concrete. Their blockade, supported by five other blockades, slowed several Maxxam operations all morning, including the fleet of haul trucks used to transport downed ancient trees out of the Mattole.

Logging crews have committed violence against activists in the woods and at the gates. Several backwoods activists reported being beaten with sticks by loggers as sheriff's deputies looked the other way. Loggers then chased these activists up trees and piled wood debris at the base while one logger waved a can of gasoline and threatened to burn them out. At several outer gates, truck drivers punched, spit on, bumped with their trucks and threw hot coffee in the faces of activists.

A 19-year-old has been charged with eight felonies for leading a group of 17 underage students into the Mattole on May 11. Eight of the youth were arrested, and all of them had parental permission to participate. None of the parents are pressing charges.

Wolves and Poodles

A genetic engineering research-destroying wolf to all the "vandals" who've caused genetic-engineering researchers to fear that their work will be destroyed. According to a March 13 Fresno Bee article, with every act of vandalism aimed at genetically-engineered (GE) crops, central San Joaquin Valley, California, agricultural researchers wonder whether they will be the target of the next attack.

The article also stated that some scientists are concerned that the vandalism could have a chilling effect on genetic research "possibly causing some scientists to not plant GE crops for fear they would be trampled."

Sounds like time to find a new line of work ...

A big, bad wolf that scared the capitalists away to the more militant wing of the anti-globalization movement for the mere threat of disruption which caused the World Bank to cancel its upcoming June conference on ending poverty in Barcelona, Spain. A World Bank statement issued to the press said, "Despite our efforts to approach some of the groups that plan to demonstrate and include them in the conference, the intention of many of these groups ... is to interrupt it ... A conference on reducing poverty should take place in an atmosphere of peace, without provocation, violence or intimidation."

At this rate, protesters can just stay home and issue threatening statements from time to time, and the capitalists will run away!

A power of the rank and file, alliancebuilding wolf to Walt Creekmore of Teamsters Local 174 in Seattle, Washington, for slamming Teamster boss Jimmy Hoffa Jr.'s support of oil drilling in Alaska's Arctic National Wildlife Refuge (ANWR).

Creekmore told an EF! Journal corespondent, "I was very angry to learn of Jr. Hoffa's ANWR position, for this seems to be a deliberate attempt on his part to destroy the excellent working relationships and mutual aid and support on many levels that we have built here in the Pacific Northwest... between rank and file Teamsters and our good friends in the environmental community... I hope that you will not judge the

A plastic-coated Frankenpoodle to researchers at the Agricultural Research Service Citrus and Subtropical Products Laboratory in Winter Haven, Florida, who applied for a patent for a new edible coating made of food grade polyvinyl acetate to prevent fruit decay after harvest without discoloring the fruit.

Polyvinyl acetate is a synthetic polymer that can be applied to fruits and vegetables by dipping, spraying or brushing. In addition to the polyvinyl acetate, the coating for fresh produce can include plasticizers, surfactants that aid coverage, gloss enhancing additives and other ingredients.

A lapdog of the cattle industry poodle to Montana Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks and US Fish and Wildlife Service bureaucrats for sentencing a 22year-old grizzly to death by lethal injection. The 540pound bear, known as the Falls Creek Male, had taken down cattle grazing on Forest Service allotments for the last 12 years by snapping the necks and crushing the skulls of 900-pound yearlings.

After successfully eluding attempts to relocate him for years, the griz was darted and executed April 18 for preying on newborn calves on private land and "displaying an uncharacteristic boldness around humans."

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NORWEGIAN GOVERNMENT PURSUES WOLF GENOCIDE

The Norwegian government accomplished their short-term goal of killing an entire wolf pack in Oesterdalen. The last two wolves in the Atndal pack were shot from a helicopter at the end of March. While being unfavorable in itself, the loss of nine wolves of an already precariously small population will accelerate the decline in genetic variation. The brutality of this action is bound to backfire on those responsible, as there are strong indications that the Norwegian public is becoming increasingly aware of the issue.

The cornerstone of the Norwegian government's management strategy is the zoning out of wolves from most of the country's land mass, most of which is excellent wolf habitat. The ramifications of this strategy are well known among wolf biologists. The establishment of new packs as a result of dispersed individuals migrating far away from their original home range is an important element in their utilizing the existing genetic variability and its natural protection against inbreeding. It is not easy to determine the precise time frame for when the detrimental effects of the

zoning will become noticeable. Suffice to say that the very principle disrupts the normal dynamics of wolf societies and undeniably contributes negatively to the Scandinavian wolf's predicament, hence it is unacceptable from a biological viewpoint. To deny the wolf its rightful place in nature is very evil. The positive effects of predation pressure upon the prey populations were established long ago. Alertness, fleetness, strength, endurance and superior senses of wild animals are a direct result of the presence of powerful environmental pressures, especially natural predation. In addition, the ungulate population will naturally be less healthy unless wolves are present to constantly select the strongest animals for survival. The Norwegian zoning policy hinders these mechanisms by effectively preventing the wolves from filling their role in the ecosystem, since they are not allowed to establish packs in the country save for within a ridiculously small area located in the extreme southeast of Norway.

The most serious effect of the Norwegian zoning principle may be its psychological influence on people.

Cellular Phones Killing Gorillas and Elephants in the Congo

Struggling to survive the forces. of globalization, miners in the Congo region are killing elephants and gorillas for food to support their coltan mining operations. Coltan is an ore used to coat many electronic devices including components of cell phones. The increase in global sales of electronic devices has resulted in the price of coltan skyrocketing from \$30 per pound to \$400 per pound. Profits have lured miners into Kahuzi-Biega National Park where the elephant population plummeted from 3,000 individuals five years ago to less than 350 today. The United Nations has issued a report that calls for an embargo on all coltan shipments in the region until safeguards are established.

Mexican Anti-logging Activists Granted Appeal

A winner of last year's Goldman Environmental Prize, Rodolfo Montiel Flores and another member of Campesinos Ecologistas de La Sierra de Petalan, Teodoro Cabera, have been granted an appeal of their rigged conviction on drug and weapons charges. The two activists have been in solitary confinement for nearly two years following confessions that were extracted after days of torture. Amnesty International says the real reason they were jailed was their success in organizing peasant farmers to resist rampant logging by Boise Cascade in Mexico's southern state of Guerrero. Mexican President Vicente Fox ordered a review of their case shortly after taking office, and the use of torture by Mexican police was made illegal this year. At the time of their arrest, the Mexican army killed one of Montiel's friends. Since then, four more members of Montiel's group have been assassinated and many others have fled their homes because of death threats.

"Eco-terrorist" Hysteria Sweeps Several States

As activists increasingly turn to more drastic forms of direct action, a wave of "eco-terrorist" hysteria is sweeping state legislatures.

The Oregon Legislature recently passed a bill to protect Starbucks from people opposed to capitalism. In an Orwellian twist, the bill would classify actions taken against corporate property as hate crimes—a designation usually reserved for those attacking oppressed minorities based on religion, race or sexual preference.

Washington's version of the ecoterror hysteria makes no distinction between graffiti artists and child molesters, as even the slightest damage to a business could be considered a terrorist act.

While drought and a windblown Texas fungus threaten the Kansas wheat crop, Governor Bill Graves has found the time to chase after the possibility of anti-genetic crop protesters. With help from the Kansas Fertilizer and Chemical Association (KFCA) and the American Crop Protection Association, a state law was "impartially" amended to impose stiffer penalties on people who decontaminate genetically altered crop sites. The chairman of KFCA said, "This legislation is a pre-emptive strike and will help deter the growing number of eco-terrorist attacks against crop production."

There have been no known attacks of this kind in the state. The governor's action may just encourage Kansas citizens to investigate the threat of genetically modified crops, as well as the influence of corporate farm chemical lobbyists.

In a similar rush to save transgenic crops, the Arizona Legislature passed a law aimed at environmental groups that claim credit for destroying genetically engineered crop experiments. Republican Governor Jane Hull lauded the measure as she signed it into law, proclaiming that "those who destroy crops or agricultural research will be liable for double damages." The law takes effect 90 days after the Legislature adjourns this year.





A quarter-century after the most spectacular dam failure in BuRec history, the agency is at a crossroads.

One of the darkest days for the US Bureau of Reclamation (BuRec) dawned brightly on June 5, 1976, near the town of Wilford, Idaho. There, across the Teton River, lay BuRec's newly constructed Teton Dam, rapidly filling with runoff from snowmelt high in the Grand Teton Mountains. Some observers became concerned that the reservoir behind the Earthen dam was being filled too rapidly. According to some accounts, BuRec allowed water to rise in the new reservoir twice as fast as engineering standards permit.

The 305-foot Teton Dam, completed in November 1975, was built to store, divert and deliver virtually all of the river's flow for irrigation. Despite evidence from geological investigations that suggested the site was unsuitable for a dam, Congress appropriated money and BuRec willingly complied. Just another taxpayer-subsidized pork barrel project, but this time the river didn't cooperate.

At 9:30 a.m., several leaks sprang from the face of the dam. Ominously, the trickle soon became a gusher and earth began sliding down the dam face. Bulldozers, still onsite for finishing minor grading work on the newly completed dam construction project, were hastily brought out to repair the gaping holes that were growing into craters faster than the machines could work. *continued on page 54*

There is a tremendous irony in public lands ranching. On one hand, ranchers and cowboys are canonized in the Cowboy Myth as icons of stalwartness, hard work and an aw-shucks, salt of the earth mentality. In reality, ranchers are the most pervasively destructive force on our public land, with logging placed a distant second. Via outlandish subsidies, you, I and Uncle Sam support the cattle industry with drought and fire relief, fencing, water tanks, windmills and bargain basement grazing fees. Our government kills hundreds of thousands of wild creatures each year to protect ranchers' cows against predators such as wolves, mountain lions and coyotes.

In return we get erosion, endangered species, habitat destruction, flash-flooding, exotic weeds, desertification and some of the most degraded landscape on Earth. Much of it will never recover.

George Wuerthner of Eugene, Oregon, is one of the most outspoken leaders against public lands ranching. George dispels the Cowboy Myth and forecasts the demise of public lands ranching—one of the biggest farces in American history.

Tim: When did you begin working to dispel the Cowboy Myth?

George: I evolved gradually into a grazing activist. In high school, I worked in a hamburger fast food place. I thought the best part of the job was the free hamburgers. I even worked on a couple of ranches in college. I mended fences, rode through the sagebrush chasing steers and bucked bales of hay. I have some firsthand experience with ranching and its lifestyle. It has its attractions—especially if you ignore the environmental costs.

I began to re-assess my views on ranching as a result of my college experiences. As an undergraduate, I studied wildlife biology and botany. Then I went to graduate school in range science hoping to get a job as a range conservationist with the government. In other words, I was not inherently hostile to livestock production or ranching. But as I looked more and more at the ultimate causes of many western environmental issues, I kept coming back to one industry-the livestock industry. I came to conclude that the cumulative environmental effects of this industry easily outstrip all others, hence my conversion to a grazing activist.

Tim: George, what is the problem with public lands ranching?

George: It affects more public land than any other activity. Some 90 percent of all Bureau of Land Management (BLM) lands, 70 percent of Forest Service lands, dozens of national parks, wildlife refuges, state lands and even county lands are affected by livestock production. *continued on page 56*

Tumbleweed Free— Rogue Cops Still On the Loose

Legal battles from a July 2000. protest against a meeting of the International Society for Animal Genetics (ISAG) continue in Minnesota. Twin Cities Mutual Aid Defense Committee (TCMADC) was formed in August 2000, to help in the defense of Robert "Tumbleweed" Czernik, a Minneapolis man charged with felony possession of illegal mushrooms following an illegal and politically motivated raid by heavily armed local police, FBI, and DEA agents. Tumbleweed ended up in the hospital with facial injuries suffered from police brutality. Fourteen others were arrested and police seized a large amount of personal property.

On May 18, 2001, Tumbleweed appeared in court and took a deferment offer that includes oneyear probation period with three months of urine testing. In May 2002, the felony charge will be dropped. The deferment agreement was accepted by Tumbleweed because the judge refused to allow testimony concerning the ISAG, police surveillance or details of the protest in the trial. TCMADC's efforts helped direct pressure on Hennepin County from around the world.

Also on May 18, Rory Scoles was found not guilty of a gross misdemeanor of violent resistance of arrest stemming from the ISAG protest. The jury wisely disbelieved the lies of several police officers, yet still found Scoles guilty of unlawful assembly and simple resisting arrest. The remaining charges against ISAG arrestees are tied up in legal appeals relating to police undercover operations and abuse. The Pulse, a Minnesota weekly, recently posted a picture of the undercover cop who beat Tumbleweed in July and jumped "Agent Pecan" at a demonstration on May Day, 2000.

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Vieques: Ecology Under Siege

The most alarming contamination factor in Vieques, Puerto Rico, is the US Navy. The 50 years that the Navy has been operating in Vieques can be classified as "a half century of environmental disaster." The Puerto Rican environmentalist Dr. Neftalí García, in his work Historical and Natural Consequences of the US Navy Presence in Vieques, affirms that the military practices have produced serious destruction of the natural resources. "The Navy destroyed the coco groves of Bahía Tapón, Bahía de la Chiva, Pint Brigadier, Puerto Negro and has begun the destruction in other areas like Bahía Salinas del Sur."

Professor José Seguinot Barbosa, director of the geography department of the University of Puerto Rico at Río Piedras, in his study Vieques, the Ecology of an Island Under Siege, maintains that, "The eastern tip of the island (where the Navy carries out its bombing practice) constitutes a region with more craters per kilometer than the moon." In the same work, Seguinot states, "The destruction of the natural and human resources of Viegues violates the basic norms of international law and human rights. At the state and federal level the laws pertaining to the coastal zone, water and noise quality, underwater resources, archaeological resources and land use, among others are violated."

The Viequense chemical engineer, Rafael Cruz Pérez, in *Contamination Produced by Explosives and Residuals of Explosives in Vieques, Puerto Rico,* describes three sources of contamination that result from the Navy's activities in Vieques: the chemical composition of the missiles' charge and the composition of the reaction, the particles of dust and rock that are thrown into the atmosphere as a result of the impact of the explosions and metallic residues left by the projectiles when they fragment, as well as the scrap iron used as targets in the bombing area.

Cruz was an artillery officer in the US Army and worked in Vieques studying the environmental effects of the artillery practices that are conducted. He describes the situation of Cerro Matías and other adjacent sectors (the

Navy's bombing zone) like a "battlefield during World War I, where the ground and a great part of the vegetation has been reduced. Cerro Matías can be considered in its fundamental characteristics as a giant deposit of solid waste."

The Viequense engineer adds "according to the information provided by the US Navy, this material is never removed, instead it is detonated or simply covered over with dirt. As a result of the effects of the explosions, the sea breezes and natural atmospherization, the metals are oxidized or decomposed changing in an accelerated form into products that contaminate the environment. In the same study, we find that the concentration of the contaminants (TNT, NO3, NO2, RDX and Tetryl) in the sources of drinking water in the towns of Isabel Segunda and La Esperanza are the same or similar to those found in the ponds and lagoons in the bombing area in Cerro Matías. The study does not explain how these substances reach the water sources, located more than 14 kilometers from the bombing area."

The author points out "that components resulting from the explosions in the bombing area in the east of Vieques are transported by diverse mechanisms toward the civilian area in the center of the island. In the case of the explosion of pieces of artillery, missiles and bombs, there exist various factors, which increase the facility of movement of these contaminants. The effects of the prevailing winds in the explosion area disperse the cloud of contaminants generated by an explosion. The fine particles become part of the atmosphere and are transported through the air over great distances. We find that the effective concentration of particles over the civil area of Vieques exceeds 197 micrograms per cubic meter and therefore exceeds the legal federal criteria for clean air."

In May 1999, the US Navy admitted it fired depleted uranium projectiles (DU) on Vieques. The information was offered in response to a Freedom of Information Act request by the Military Toxics Project. According to Navy officials, a pilot accidentally loaded his aircraft with DU rounds and fired them on Vieques. The same documentation explains that of 363 rounds fired, only 52 were recovered. US forces practiced extensively in Vieques for the Gulf War and the military interventions in the Balkans. In both areas DU weapons were used heavily. Several NATO countries are currently investigating a possible relationship between the recent cancer deaths of soldiers who were deployed to areas where large amounts of DU projectiles were fired.

Recent scientific studies indicate high levels of heavy metals are present in the environment. The University of Puerto Rico's Graduate School of Public Health recently reported results of a study that indicate Vieques has a 27 percent higher cancer case rate compared to the rest of Puerto Rico.

These scientific studies confirm that the activities of the US Navy result in an environmental crisis with serious consequences for the human and physical geographic health. An obvious solution is to end the overwhelming source of contamination in Vieques: US Navy out of Vieques!

HAWAII MOBILIZES AGAINST THE ASIAN DEVELOPMENT BANK

The week of May 9, activists in Hawaii mobilized for their first mass demonstrations against the institutions of corporate globalization, as the Asian Development Bank (ADB) held its annual meeting in Honolulu. The week of resistance included speakers, panels, debates, films, an indigenous peoples' forum, puppet-making workshops, a critical mass bike ride and a march and rally with 1,000 people in front of the convention center.

Weeks before the meetings, the Honolulu police worked with the mainstream media to create an aura of fear around the demonstrations. Almost daily, local newspapers and TV predicted "unruly," "crazy" and "raucous" "troublemakers... from the mainland" provoking "riots," while describing in detail the tear-gas, extra security, national guard and hospital preparations that \$7 million of tax money was to pay for. Their strategy was simple: marginalize the demonstrators and scare people into staying home.

But demonstrators wouldn't be marginalized and citizens didn't stay home. Auditoriums and churches were filled as speakers explained how the ADB mandates the dismantling of local economies, the destruction of ecosystems and indigenous lifestyles and the elimination of social services. People who have been directly affected by ADB programs in Asia told of the privatization of state enterprises, minimum wage caps, reductions of agricultural subsidies, user fees for water and other injustices that have been imposed by this for-profit bank's "restructuring" of their communities. Public debates were held where ADB officials could not adequately defend implementing projects that tear entire communities without any democratic process, line the pockets of development companies and in the end are often unsustainable.

More than 1,000 people gathered in downtown Honolulu armed with brightly colored puppets, artwork, drums, chants, dances and music. Kanaka maoli, indigenous Hawaiians, led a festive march to the convention. Once there, ADB President Tadeo Chino came out of the fortress to face the demonstrators as they presented

each of their demands for change, followed by the question: "Do you understand?" He answered each time that yes, he understood. But not surprisingly, Chino declined to make any promises for change. After an hour, demonstrators continued the march through the Waikiki Beach area and ended at Kapiolani Park with an afternoon of music, speakers and food, compliments of Food Not Bombs.

Police tried to divert attention from their egregious numbers by standing behind bicycles instead of barricades, carrying hidden guns and dressing in safari hats and brown print vests over white t-shirts, making them look more like tour guides than enforcers of oppression. Score one for the Honolulu Police Department's new public relations firm, though nothing could hide the island's largest security build-up since World War II.

Before May, not many people in Hawaii had ever heard of the ADB. Now few in Honolulu haven't heard about its controversial projects. The meetings spurred a flurry of community networking and organizing, the formation of indymedia, medical and legal teams, a series of nonviolence trainings and the radicalizing of folks who had never been part of a mass action before. The police state was brought to view for all to see,

> with its pervasive presence, chemical weapons, helicopters, crowd-listening devices and a bill for the taxpayers that sparked public outcry.

> The protests didn't shut the meetings down, as many would have liked, but as one demonstrator said, "On a small island in the middle of the Pacific Ocean, for the first Hawaiian meeting of a little-known institution, it would have been tough to gather the numbers to do that. So we followed a different strategy. We brought public awareness to ADB practices while exposing

the extent of the police state and showing ourselves to be intelligent, peaceful citizens that couldn't be silenced. All the people who thought about coming out to the rally but didn't because of media-induced fears of riots and tear-gas will be with us next time. And the state will have a hard time getting \$7 million for security again.

"We can look at this week and see what worked well and what could be improved upon. We will learn from every action. We were not organizing for a one-time event. This is an ongoing struggle, and just one part of a strong, worldwide movement."

Globalization and Resistance in Colombia

"You spray us like we are cockroaches."

"Plan Colombia = plan de muerte" (Plan Colombia = plan of death)

I saw this graffiti during a Witness for Peace human rights delegation to Colombia in March. One hundred of us were there to assess the impacts of US policy in Colom-

bia. The message is bleak and depressingly accurate.

Plan Colombia refers to the \$1.6billion US aid package funneled into Colombia over the last two years. The vast majority of it (more than 85 percent) is military aid, ostensibly to fight the drug war. Originally military aid was to be a small part of a much broader multilateral aid package to address the underlying social causes of Colombia's 35-year civil war, as well as for the eradication of illicit crops.

Unfortunately, the promised social investment has shriveled up like a fumigated field. What is left is a war plan, focused on one major military operation: the push into southern Colombia, where the majority of the world's *coca* is now grown.

Thousands of small farmers have migrated to southern Colombia in recent years, forced from their homes by decades of violence and policies that were specifically intended to push them off their land.

The area is generally controlled by the *Fuerzas Armadas Revolucionarias de Colombia* (FARC), Colombia's largest guerrilla group. The FARC now makes millions of dollars a year by taxing the booming *coca* production.

That illicit revenue is the true target of Plan Colombia. The plan centers on a massive campaign of aerial fumigation of *coca* fields in guerrilla-controlled areas. It includes dozens of helicopters and large-scale counterinsurgency training of elite Colombian units to provide ground support for spray planes that will inevitably come under guerrilla attack. It is a tried and true counterinsurgency strategy of attacking civilian support networks to isolate and defeat the guerrillas.

Despite the "bail out" propaganda that US war-makers have used to sell this plan to taxpayers, Plan Colombia serves mostly the narrow interests of the US military and its corporate partners. They appear to be willing to sacrifice the civilian population to gain control of southern Colombia, an area laden with oil, among other riches.

Defeating the FARC means removing a major obstacle to unbridled exploitation of Colombia's markets and resources. It also provides the context for repression of Colombian civil society, much like every other cold war in Latin America. Those who would oppose the global economic paradigm are lumped in with guerrillas and targeted for arrest, torture and

assassination.

Heavy lobbying and large campaign contributions by the helicopter companies Sikorsky and Bell ensured that they will reap millions of dollars from Plan Colombia. Monsanto, responsible for Agent Orange in Vietnam, hauls in millions from the herbicides, while private military contractors make millions more providing pilots and logistics.

The biggest losers, of course, are the people who live in southern Colombia. As one *campesino* put it, "You spray us like we are cockroaches."

Supporters of Plan Colombia claim the fumigation is harmless, that the herbicide in question is just Roundup, the common household brand.

The truth is that the herbicide being sprayed over thousands of acres of Colombian countryside is a highly concentrated form, dubbed Roundup Ultra, which also contains other chemicals to make it more effective against the resilient *coca*. This toxic brew has

not been safety tested, and an independent researcher's requests for samples have been denied.

The spray campaign is nothing short of a crime against nature and humanity. Food crops, drinking wells, alternative crop projects and biodiverse rainforest are sprayed with little to spare. Respiratory illnesses and skin rashes are rampant in the fumigation zones, especially in children.

The fumigation campaign draws no distinction between farmers growing *coca* for the drug trade and indigenous people who have been growing *coca* for thousands of years as a fundamental part of their culture. For them, even a crop substitution program is an assault on their identity and their continued existence as native people. Fumigation is a death knell, destroying the forest and the land they rely on for survival. No asesinaran la esperanza (They will not assassinate hope)

----SECOND LINE OF THE GRAFFITI

The group I traveled with visited Cauca, which is scheduled for Phase II of Plan Colombia next year. A few years ago, thousands of *campesinos*, Afro-Colombians, unionists and others blockaded the Pan-American Highway to protest the economic policies and neglect of the government.

Hundreds of thousands

have hit the streets and been met with violent repression. Many have died in street battles that make Seattle look tame.

For millions of people in Latin America, matters of free trade and the IMF and World Bank are matters of life and death. When water rates quadruple overnight because of privatization, when cuts in basic services threaten health and when coffee prices plummet in the global marketplace "race to the bottom," millions suffer.

We met with Cauca's governor, Floro Tunuvalá, the first indigenous governor in Colombia's history. He was elected by a broad coalition that grew out of the Pan-American Highway blockade. Floro is one of six governors of departments in southern Colombia who oppose the fumigation and military aid of Plan Colombia. They are working on a proposal for an alternative plan based on manual eradication and social investment.

We visited a small village that had been targeted for several massacres in the preceding months. Indigenous and peasant communities have been hit hardest by the civil war, suffering violence and extortion by left-wing guerrillas and right-wing paramilitary death squads. In contested areas, civilians are the targets for assassination and massacre, by whichever armed actor accuses them of helping the other side.

I slept in the house of a man who never sleeps in his own house. He had been threatened for attempting to bring paramilitary assassins to justice, but he refused to back down. He explained that resistance was the only answer to the oppression his people faced and that if he were killed others would take his place. "A man who lives fully never dies," he said.

After hearing his emotional testi-



mony, I stood outside his house in the dark while he went off to sleep in the fields. I listened to the sounds of the lush *campo* and pondered the surreal evil that lurked out there amidst the overwhelming natural beauty.

In those moments, I realized that the well-armed assassins were not the biggest threat; they were merely a symptom of the greater global disease. The true evil is global capitalism embodied in the spreading cancers of IMF, FTAA and World Bank. Resistance in the US continues to grow. On April 2, six young women from Oberlin College locked down in Washington, DC, disrupting a conference of Sikorsky executives. Other actions have taken place at the Sikorsky plant in Connecticut and at Fort Bragg, North Carolina, home of US Army Special Forces units that are training the Colombian military. A Monsanto boycott is already underway.

The threats are clear, but the solutions are complex. Activists in industrialized countries must sharpen their critiques of the global economic disease by seeing it from the nuanced perspective of those who are impacted the most. Only then can we build the alliances necessary to resist globally.

As for Plan Colombia, US public opinion is turning away from the hysteria of the drug war, which may open the space to discredit this *plan de muerte* and expose it for what it really is: the *final conquest* of the hemisphere.

1981 Sarah Kite, from the British Union Against Vivisection, worked inside the HLS lab in Huntingdon for six months. Her investigation gave the first glimpse inside the laboratory.

"A series of numbers instantly makes me recall a primate's tattoo. I see the finely textured skin of the macaques. I see their human-like fingernails and their little navels. I see them using their seldom supplied "enrichment" mirrors, not to look at their own reflection, but to examine parts of a barren concrete room they have no chance to see. "Each one has their own individual fingerprints," someone once told me. I don't know if this is true, but I do know that each of them look uniquely different. I know that if the fur and skin are torn off in a violent cage injury, the healed skin looks no different than a human beings'."

Huntingdon Life Sciences (HLS) has been the subject of five undercover investigations exposing tremendous cruelty to animals. Internationally, activists have committed themselves to shutting down HLS after investigators' video footage, photos and diaries have shown workers punching beagle puppies in the face, dissecting a conscious monkey, transplanting a frozen pig's heart into a baboon and falsifying scientific data and procedures. As recent as September 2000, leaked documents from HLS exposed more than 520 errors and omissions due to botched organ transplant experiments where hundreds of monkeys and wild-caught baboons died after genetically manipulated piglet heart and kidney transplants.

As Europe's largest and most notorious contract animal testing company, and with a laboratory in East Millstone, New Jersey, HLS conducts chemical tests commissioned by the top names in the pharmaceutical, biotech and agrochemical industries. Annually in HLS' labs, roughly 180,000 animals are forced to ingest, inhale and endure all sorts of toxic chemicals, including toxic doses of pharmaceuticals, pesticides and chemicals such as weed killers and disinfectants. HLS has 70,000 animals waiting to die at any one time—dogs, cats, monkeys, guinea pigs, rabbits, rats, mice and birds. These animals are described as "quiet, huddled, shivering, unsteady and in spasm."

The campaign to close HLS started in England several years ago and is heating up here in the US. According to a Stop Huntingdon Animal Cruelty (SHAC) spokesperson, "For every 500 animals HLS brutally murders everyday, there are 500 strategies that activists will employ to destroy their vile business." If the campaign to close HLS continues with the level of tenacity and ferocity shown in recent months, the laboratory will soon become a distant memory.

Since a national protest in the US in April, public support, media attention and energy in the campaign have been unprecedented. During the week following the protest, Huntingdon's stock price fell *Page 24 Earth First! Litha 2001*

from \$1.82 to a low of \$1.25. Attention will now be centered on Huntingdon's main financial backers: Stephens, Inc. and Bank of New York.

HLS may close a year from now, or tomorrow. But one thing is certain—they will close. Fourteen beagles living free tell us so. A flipped car and smashed windows tell us so. Dozens of activists, eyes burning from pepper-spray, refusing to back down from the front lines tell us so. For the 70,000 animals still imprisoned in their laboratories—we will not lose.

December 2000 HLS removed from the New York Stock Exchange. A growing list of investment companies pull out of HLS, including Citibank, Merrill Lynch and Charles Schwab.

• Fifth HLS undercover investigation released by SHAC with shocking video footage, including of a monkey escaping from an HLS lab.

September 2000 HLS exposed in UK for substandard research practices after documents leaked to animal activists showed the suffering from botched cross-species transplant experiments.

December 2000

• Stephens, Inc. sued SHAC USA, Voices for Animals and website administrator Kevin Mudrick for constructing a website (www.stephenskills.com). Stephens lost the lawsuit when the judge ruled that the use of the Stephens logo and website design was not for commercial use and was protected by the First Amendment.

- January 2001 US investor, Stephens, Inc., saved HLS from closing its doors by extending a \$33-million loan.

February 2001 HLS Managing Director Brian Cass was beaten with baseball bats outside his home in England.

• The Animal Liberation-Tactical Internet Response Network (AL-TIRN) held an electronic civil disobedience action against HLS. According to AL-TIRN, "The campaign against HLS is now being intensified to include a new area of protest aimed at blocking the information highway of the company." The announcement by AL-TIRN comes on the heels of an action-filled week that saw more than 1,500 UK activists lay siege to several of HLS' biggest clients causing severe disruption, while US activists flooded the phone lines, email systems and offices of Stephens, Inc.

March 2001 Fourteen beagles liberated from Huntingdon's laboratory in New Jersey. This marked the first time activists on either side of the Atlantic liberated animals from HLS.
HLS and Stephens, Inc. file a Civil Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organization (RICO) lawsuit in an attempt to pin allegations of physical attacks, bomb threats, property destruction, burglary and harassment on the Animal Defense League, In Defense of Animals and Stop Huntingdon Animal Cruelty (SHAC). According to a SHAC spokesperson, "This SLAPP-suit is completely baseless, and we are looking forward to dragging this through the legal system as HLS will have to spend what little money they have left in a legal fight."

April 2001 National protest against HLS: Approximately 150 activists converged on the New Jersey laboratory. Four arrests were made as police formed together and charged into the crowd.

• Henning Jonassen, Director of the Necropsy Laboratory, had the windows of his car and house shattered and his car flipped over. Frankie Trull, president of the Foundation for Biomedical Research told the *Courier News* that "such terrorist campaigns intimidate researchers and undermine research. For those who don't support animal research to take these matters into their own hands... has a chilling effect on people who conduct animal research."

• Boisterous protests held at several Stephens' offices, including Atlanta, Chicago and Boston. In San Francisco, 12 demonstrators blockaded themselves inside the conference room of Stephens' office, they were removed after two dozen police officers forced their way inside by axing through a plexi-glass window.

May 2001 Week of action against HLS in New Jersey. HLS had been granted a temporary restraining order placing restrictions on protests at the homes of HLS employees. Not deterred, activists proceeded to the home of Thomas Perna, Senior Vice President of the Bank of New York to protest.

• The Animal Liberation Front claimed responsibility for hacking into the website of Primate Products, a company that supplies the primates used in the product-testing research at HLS. The "improved" website contained several graphic photos of primates butchered in research laboratories and even contained photos of actual primates from inside HLS that were taken during undercover investigations.

June 2001 Protests at the annual HLS shareholders' meeting in New York City on June 14. • Campaign kick-off against another financial backer of HLS, the Bank of New York.

Ongoing in the UK Every weekday, a crowd of protesters gather outside the gates of HLS' main lab in Huntingdon. As workers come and go, they meet screaming protesters. Every eight weeks, SHAC UK holds national demonstrations where more than 1,000 protesters target the lab or a company affiliated with HLS. • Large demonstrations are followed up with demonstrations at the homes of workers. The Animal Liberation Front has waged a series of car bombings and attacks on workers' homes. The HLS employee turnover rate is high.

Following Them Wherever They Go... Protests Against HLS Investors, Stephens, Inc.

Following several undercover exposés, investors and customers began leaving Huntingdon Life Sciences (HLS) in droves. Over the past year, Stop Huntingdon's Animal Cruelty in the United Kingdom (SHAC UK) has targeted individual financial supporters with intense protests. The campaign in the UK has made Huntingdon financially untouchable and few institutions are willing to contend with being targeted for supporting HLS.

HLS was on its last leg in January 2001, and within hours of declaring bankruptcy, Stephens, Inc. stepped in. Ever since, Stephens, an investment banking firm headquartered in Little Rock, Arkansas, has come under fire for extending a \$33-million loan to save HLS. Without Stephens, HLS' largest shareholder, the laboratory doors would have closed.

Activists have since presented a clear message: If you're involved with HLS, you'll have to deal with an angry animal rights movement everywhere you go. Stephens' loan runs out in January 2002, and activists are working to insure that they do not renew it.

When SHAC activists learned that president Warren Stephens was a member of the exclusive Augusta Golf Club in Georgia, a protest was organized for the National Golf Tournament on March 16. Five people were arrested for disorderly conduct while bringing attention to Warren Stephens and his staunch support of animal torture.

A spokesperson for SHAC USA stated, "Stephens, Inc. is responsible for the deaths of more than 500 animals daily. Everywhere Warren Stephens goes, we will make sure the name HLS goes with him, a name synonymous with animal cruelty. This is only the beginning of the headache

the animal rights movement will cause Stephens and all others connected to that vile laboratory."

This protest came on the heels of several phone blockades against Stephens, Inc., demonstrations outside their offices across the country and an Internet sit-in that several times brought the company's website to a halt.

About 50 protesters gathered on March 21-23, for the next target: Stephens' investment conference in Las Vegas. Police, outnumbering activists by at least two to one, grossly overreacted to the peaceful demonstration.

Jake Conroy from Seattle raised his hand to block the view of a police video camera upon him. He was subsequently tackled by police and charged with obstructing police business and resisting arrest. A medical doctor who had rented a room at a casino was followed to his room,

> placed in a choke hold by security, then charged with battery.

Other arrests included five demonstrators who drove into a golf course parking lot. They were not asked to leave and were all arrested for trespassing. While in custody, some of the arrestees were interrogated by the FBI about the Animal and Earth Liberation Fronts who, it turns out, local police expected to be at these protests.

Hacking at the Roots of the Tree of Evil

A Campaign to Transform the Global Financial System

Citigroup Met with Protests Around the World

To paraphrase Thoreau, for every 1,000 activists hacking at the branches of the tree of evil only one is hacking at the roots. It is in this spirit of effective radicalism that people around the world have been uniting to confront Citigroup, one of the world's largest financial institutions. Made up of Citibank, Wall Street investment giant Salomon Smith Barney, Citifinancial and Traveler's Insurance, Citigroup is a \$720-billion corporation and a corner-

stone of the global economy. Behind the WTO, World Bank and multinational corporations is a fundamentally flawed financial system. This system, aptly described by Ed Abbey as embodying "the ideology of the cancer cell," is pathological in its very nature. It is a system defined by colonial genocide, blind consumerism and economic growth that puts the interests of corporate elites ahead of the well-being of all other life. To stop this assault on the natural world, it is essential that we unmask the real power brokers of the global economy and leverage our power against giant financial corporations like Citigroup.

Citigroup profits off projects that destroy fragile ecosystems, violate human rights and displace indigenous communities. From underwriting Maxxam Corporation's liquidation of the California Redwoods, genetically engineering trees for Chilean pulp mills and converting primary rainforest to palm plantations in Indonesia, Citigroup knows how to make a profit from killing a forest. Close your eyes and point to a place on the globe— Citigroup is sure to be there.

On April 11, 2001, as part of an international day of action, activists in 80 cities on five continents rose in unison to challenge the Citigroup

stranglehold over communities and ecosystems around the globe. In a colorful display of demonstrations, educational events and creative actions, activists exposed Citigroup's involvement in fueling destruction. Unwilling to be complicit, people cut up their Citigroup credit cards by the hundreds and signed pledges saying they will never do business with "the world's most destructive bank." Citigroup offices were picketed, their phone lines clogged and many potential customers turned away.



The next week, Citigroup's annual shareholders' meeting was rocked by a demonstration put on by several organizations, including Rainforest Action Network, United for a Fair Economy, National Organization for Women, Inner City Press/Community on the Move and Student Environmental Action Coalition. Because Citigroup is a global player, the campaign is a vehicle to tangibly confront the system in a way that makes actual gains while educating people about how the global financial system creates social, economic and environmental injustice.

Individuals and institutions are reexamining our narrow definition of "profit" to move beyond a bottomline that ignores environmental and social justice. More people are recognizing that the true wealth of the planet rests not in stock options and cash flow projections but rather in the Earth's natural cycles, biological and cultural diversity, the strength of our communities, the depths of our imagination and the creativity of our actions. There are realistic models for non-destructive economics like the European Triodos bank and even Oregon's Shore Pacific who have incorporated the mission of funding

ecological and communitybased alternatives. Step by step people are beginning to dismantle corporate control of the financial system and demand economics that reflect their values.

Still, biological reality insists that while building alternatives, we transform existing institutions to stop the destruction before its too late. To address the ecological crisis, it is imperative that Citigroup immediately ban any further investments in old-growth forest destruction and prioritize lending for renewable energy, treefree lumber and paper alternatives. Citigroup must

make a firm commitment to equitable, community-based development and to address the concerns of impacted communities.

We hold the power to demand that Citigroup go *beyond the bottomline* to stop investing in the destruction of the environment and communities around the world. Now, more than ever, the situationist slogan from the 1968 Paris uprising is appropriate, "Be reasonable, demand the impossible!"

Communiqué Sent by the Earth Liberation Front

Part I

At 3:15 a.m. on Monday, May 21, the research of Toby Bradshaw was reduced to smoke and ashes. We attacked his office at the University of Washington while at the same time another group set fire to a related target in Clatskanie, Oregon, 150 miles away.

Bradshaw, the driving force in GE tree research, continues to unleash mutant genes into the environment that are certain to cause irreversible harm to forest ecosystems. After breaking into Bradshaw's office at the Center for Urban Horticulture, we inspected the building for occupants and set up incendiary devices with a modest amount of accelerant. Although we placed these devices specifically to target his office, a large portion of the building was damaged. This extensive damage was due to a surprisingly slow and poorly coordinated response from the fire department, which was evident by their radio transmissions. As long as universities continue to pursue this reckless "science," they run the risk of suffering severe losses. Our message remains clear: We are determined to stop genetic engineering.

From the torching of Catherine Ives' office at Michigan State University to the total incineration of the D and PL warehouse in Visalia, California, the Earth Liberation Front is growing and spreading. As the culture of domination forces itself into our very genes, wild fires of outrage will continue to blaze.

Early Monday morning, May 21, we dealt a blow to one of the many institutions responsible for massive hybrid tree farming in the Northwest. Incendiary devices at Jefferson Poplar in Clatskanie, Oregon, burned an office and a fleet of 13 trucks. Unfortunately, due to a design flaw, one targeted structure was left standing. We torched Jefferson Poplar because hybrid poplars are an ecological nightmare threatening native biodiversity in the ecosystem. Our forests are being liquidated and replaced with monocultured tree farms so greedy, Earth-raping corporations can make more money.

Pending legislation in Oregon and Washington further criminalizing direct action in defense of the wild will not stop us and only highlights the fragility of the ecocidal empire.

As we wrote in Clatskanie, "You cannot control what is wild."

HUMAN NATURE:

Biotechnology and Identity

With the advent of the "Digital Angel," an implanted tracking device billed as the latest in technological peace of mind for pathological parents, it seems St. John the Apocalyptic has become Ted Coppell's copywriter. Or maybe Donna Haraway, whose cyborg manifestoes are the toast of postmodern the world and have succeeded in doing what Internet and virtual reality impresarios have

been attempting for years: making technology appear liberated.

But high-tech liberation is of course liberation *from* the body, while what revolutionaries are after is liberation *of* the body, of and in the physical world. Ironically, one of the favorite postures of postmodern thinkers is that of anti-Platonism: rebellion against the abstract, eternal and absolute ideal in favor of "the real, existing world."

In hyper-civilized society, artificial life is perceived as the only real life, so when one applies the old Platonic duality to monoculture, one is faced with a merely nominal opposition: The world of insensible, ever-changing manufactured novelty designed for an existence of unceasing consumption without fulfillment. Real life is left out of the picture entirely. So when postmodernists come to terms with the necessity of a rejection of essentialist idealism (Christianity, Enlightenment ideology, etc.), they find it necessary to embrace, as its only alternative, the commodified shallow vapidity of pop culture (hence Haraway's "deep appreciation" of the

> Terminator and the vampire fad). Plato's mistake was to call real life "mere appearance;" the postmodern mistake is to call mere appearance "real life."

> Rejection of philosophical idealism entered postmodern discourse in large part through Marx's early writings, rediscovered and published in the 1920s and '30s. With his "ruthless criticism of everything existing," his attacks on Feuerbach and the German ideologists of the early 19th century, he rejects the idea of static/eternal human nature stating that "the human essence... is in social relations." His is a view of human identity and behavior existing in reciprocal relationship with prevailing social and economic conditions: "Circumstances make men just as much as men make circumstances." In variously modified forms, Althusser, Barthes and Foucault, among others, took up this historicalmaterialist view, and it remains central to much of postmodern thought.

So Haraway's cyborg is part of a larger project, attacking the idea of an abstract human essence, and "nature" as used by ruling-class intellectuals that would have us forget that the way things are is not necessarily the way they've always been or have to be (i.e. pre-Sahlins paleoanthropologic myths, the lie of innate competitiveness, Social Darwinism). Her attack consists of the assertion that nothing is natural. "Nature for us is made," she writes, and though I would change the emphasis (nature for us is made), this is certainly a perceptual reality in contemporary North America. The nature she refers to is not that ineffable reality I assume we have all experienced at some point, but rather the simplistic

caricature one sees in Sport Utility Vehicle advertisements or through one's car window at Yellowstone.

Eternal human essence can certainly be a counter-productive notion from a revolutionary standpoint. If humans are, for instance, inevitably and "naturally" competitive, what's the use fighting capitalism? If humans are inherently separate from the natural world or if there is no natural, meta-human world, what's the use of defending Mother Earth? The only possible outcome to such a view would be a radical misanthropy, which if taken to its logical conclusion, becomes genocidal.

On the other hand, if humans are essentially cooperative, gentle, kind and deeply connected with mama Earth, how the hell did things get the way they are? Belief in an essentially "good" humanity is simply not corroborated by observation of the world as it is.

The apparent solution is that humans are, at least in part, products of their external situations. *What humans are* is very different in "primitive" communal groups than on slave planta-

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tions, different in feudal estates than in modern cities. What a person is in response to enslavement is certainly different than what s/he is in response to autonomy. This is not to suggest that a person ever *is* a slave. It rather points to a methodology of social transformation involving a change in the *situation* rather than a "will power"centered attempt to convert individuals. The Situationists talked about this as psychogeography.

It seems unnecessarily extreme to reject all naturalness on the basis of the artificiality, the constructedness

of human behavior. The obvious anthropocentricity of asserting that nature is made "as both fiction and fact" opens the door wide for the

unlimited manipulation of nature, because after all there is no unmanipulated nature: "Nature is a figure, construction, artifact... Organisms are not born; they are made in world-changing techno-scientific practices." If Haraway means this in fact, these words express a profound ignorance of the physical, biological realities of which she is speaking.

Haraway seems to value the image of the cyborg as a transgressor of traditional limitations on what humans are/can be. However, the cyborg does not transgress, but rather ultimately fulfills the aim of subjugating and objectifying humanity. It marries philosophical idealism and mere-appearance pop culture by producing an abstract inhuman ideal that reduces the ultimate mysteries of humanity and the natural world to something knowable and *designable*, that remakes flesh and heart/mind into hardware and software, subjecting human life to the same cycle of obsolescence and market dependency as any other commodity.

Precisely here lies the instructive value of the cyborg. The objectification of the natural world cannot be complete unless and until the objectification of the self, and more specifically the body, is complete. The body is our constant reminder of an uncontrollable, undomesticated natural reality. It is an actual social relation that, because of its proximity and inescapability, continues despite all other conditioning to produce the impulse of wildness in each one of us. Complete subjection to market forces and the economy of domination will be impossible and even unthinkable as long as the body remains. Until it is made just another technology, until the scientific economies of control are applied to it in fundamental ways (such as those provided by genetic research and cloning), the body will remain a central symbol and physical exemplar of the physical.

This is the true nightmare posed by biotechnics: that it will forever change our definition of what it is to be human, that it will bring even the origination and development of the body under the manipulative gaze of the dispassionate specialist. That it will forever sever the last universal connection we share with harmonious disorder, spontaneous playful generation and elimination: life itself.

But just as transgression of the limitations *on* the exercise of power is dependent on material changes, so is

If humans are, for instance, inevitably and naturally competitive, what's the use of fighting capitalism? If humans are inherently separate from the natural world, what's the use of defending Mother Earth? The only possible outcome to such a view would be a radical misanthropy,

which if taken to its logical conclusion, becomes genocidal.

Cyborgism is a logical concomitant and yet another conclusion of technological civilization as a whole, Newton's universe-as-clockwork, human-as-object: another link in another chain.

Real transgression of oppressive limitations requires more than merely images or myths. As Marx putit; *"Forms* and products of consciousness cannot be dissolved by mental criticism... but only by the practical overthrow of the actual social relations." erate the body and return to Earth, we too must concentrate our efforts on the material world. We must undo their landscaping; change our physical lives and the setting thereof so that life is redefined as an intimate circle of spontaneous providence, intimate connection with provenance.

You can find it online via the Bioengineering Action Network (BAN) at www.tao.ca/~ban or write to ban@tao.ca and order copies.

Sections include: Evening Attire for the Nighttime Gardener, the Nighttime Gardener's Toolbox, the Best Time to Go, How to Spot Your Crop, What to Do When You Get There, and Appendices. Wow, what a read!

I also want to share a few snippets about this very subject from a recent conversation I had with a brave cropper lass, who said, "It's really amazing how *easy* it is to sabotage a genetic engineering research crop. The test sites can be found through Internet research without much difficulty; the locations are usually remote or at least afford good access; and the actual "decontamination" process, though at times physically grueling, is straightforward, empowering and just good clean fun!"

She added that there are two critical elements to success: forethought and boldness. By the first she meant that people need to carefully consider every aspect of an action before carrying it out, from acquisition of tools to target selection to the entry/exit of a site. Regarding the second element, she said, "We think like guerrillas and strike where and when we are not expected... because of that, we own the night!" And so can you and your friends, Sandra.

Dear Franklin P.,

I think I know what you mean. It's pretty upsetting to read about how these fascist doctors are creating glow-in-the-dark monkeys and super-trees that can withstand massive doses of Monsanto's Roundup.

As you know, arson was a favorite factic of mine along with equipment sabotage when our merry band struggled against the Industrial Revolution in England. At about the same time on this continent, Native Americans often used fire against US Army forts and outposts because it helped to level an uneven playing field. However, today, even in the Earth First! movement, setting inanimate objects aflame remains a controversial tactic. After the Earth Liberation Front (ELF) torched Vail, many folks were upset that the *EF!J* printed instructions on how to make incendiary devices. There is no consensus among EFlers on whether fire is an appropriate tool to use or not, much less where or when.

But Franklin, you are in luck because a publication has just appeared which seems to suit your needs. It's called, *Setting Fires with Electrical Timers—An ELF Guide.* The ELF website (www.earthliberationfront.com) claims that it covers "the politics and practicalities of arson. Down-to-earth advice and comprehensive how-to's about devices, fuel requirements, timers, security and more." Also on the same website you can find the old stand-by, "Arson-Around with Auntie ALF."

Incidentally, I recognize the irony of recommending that readers acquire materials on how to fight industrial society through the use of advanced technologies such as the Internet. I never thought that I, of all people, would be in that position. This should not be construed as an endorsement of industrial society, but rather a reflection on the technological trap we find ourselves in today.

Remember Franklin, arson is a very serious tactic to use. You may consider it an appropriate response to the destruction of our great, green Earth, and that's your call. But please consider carefully the strategy involved with its use, the validity of a target, the timing of a strike, the best way to communicate your message, the way an action may affect other activists/ groups and definitely take every precaution to avoid causing physical harm to yourself or others.

Lastly, try and get your communiqué out by the *EF!J's* print deadline so that we have something to cover!

WISE UP to biotech!

GeneWise's first successful action

was the disruption of a major agricultural biotechnology conference in Chicago. GeneWise activists nearly succeeded in setting up shop in a suite across the hall before biotech executives discovered their identity and pressured the sponsoring hotel to have them illegally thrown onto the street.

Not to be deterred, the well-organized upstarts staged a spirited and noisy protest in front of the Wyndham Hotel, while anxious members of the National Agricultural Biotechnology Council (NABC) peered nervously from the windows above.
Late in the summer of 1992 I was running with a company of Earth First!ers all up and down California's lost coast defending the last of the ancient Redwoods. On one particular foggy morning I got separated from my affinity group. I spent the better part of the day attempting to locate them. When dusk came I spotted a light deep under the old forest's canopy.

I approached the little wood home. I could hear singing coming from inside. Through the doorway a stocky man with yellow boots and a blue coat came to greet me, he soon invited me inside. We were in a long low room, filled with the light of amps swinging from beams of the roof; and on the table of dark polished wood stood many candles, tall and yellow, burning brightly.

I told him my tale and he laughed while offering me food and drink. We talked into the night about first the fate of the

forest and then the fate of the Earth. His name was Tom, Tom Bombadil. I asked Tom what he felt the biggest threat to the world was and he said in a word — biotechnology. It was the first time I had heard the term.

Tom began to explain not just the history of biotechnology and genetic engineering but the ancient history of how such technologies came to be in the world, I remember his tale well. "In a breath, humans, with their various techniques, gradually took the place of time: the labors of mortals replaced the work of time. Long ago in the symbols and rites accompanying metallurgical operations there came into being this idea of an active collaboration of man

and nature, and some followed the dark belief that man, by his work, was capable of superseding the process of nature. It was then only a matter of time before mineral substances, the bones of the Earth, had been emptied of their spiritual virtues and were made into inanimate objects – this was the moment that chemical science became possible."

I began to understand that the pursuit of 'science' had once been 'alchemical' and tied to social and deeply spiritual beliefs that tempered many harmful tendencies while still allowing for discovery. Tom went on to explain, as if he had witnessed it first hand, how mechanical, then chemical agriculture and then biotechnology came into existence, "You see it is the scale of values in our society which creates scientific phenomena. Biotechnology came into it's own only when life had shed its sacredness."

"I wish it need not have happened in my time," I said.

Tom's response stuck with me - "Nature", he said, "is sacred". Biotechnology will be resisted heavily wherever a culture still respects and understands the natural world. Remember that genetics has done far less to improve health than many people think. Not long ago, medical students learned almost no genetics. Today it is still irrelevant to treating the majority of diseases. The chance of using biotechnology to 'improve' nature and the human race has receded with every discovery made. Biotechnology is less like the exact science of physics and more like geography --a map that aids navigation of the terrain, but it doesn't explain how the mountains got there. This 'war of the genes' will be won with the destruction of the 'gene' concept, and it will come from people like you showing the world that life is more than just an odd assortment of genes, and it will also come from scientists who rediscover the connection between spirit and matter."

[what is] Genetice Engineering

-Genetic Engineering is the agriculture industry's latest solution to the problems it has created with its previous solutions, namely pesticides. It is an expensive process in which certain genes or strands of DNA from one organism are inserted into the DNA sequence of another organism.

Genetic engineering works on an outdated understanding of the mechanics of DNA. Until recently it was believed that one gene had the instructions for one protein which produced the expression of a clearly isolatable phenotypic feature in the organism. Now we know that DNA is much more complex. The many various proteins that one gene codes for have everything to do with the chemistry of the cellular environment around it, the genes next to it, and the timing in the organism's life span. Moving one gene into a very different nucleic environment could make it behave in unpredictable ways.

Nonetheless, this has been done to all the major monocrop species — corn, wheat, soy, cotton and oilseed, and all of these except wheat have been planted extensively in the US since 1995. This is NOT traditional breeding, although the industry says it is no different, and US regulatory agencies like the FDA and the USDA have accepted this claim of "substantial equivalence." At the same time, the transnational corporations funding this enterprise do claim that their genetic creations are different enough to deserve patents and the US patent office has agreed with them.

Genetically modified foods are not labeled in the U.S., so even if someone has a bad reaction, there is no way to trace the cause. The effects on the environment are already becoming clear as uncontainable GMO crops designed to resist herbicide are spreading and cross-pollinating to produce superweeds. Because of the centralized corporate food transport system, GMO seeds have contaminated every other crop supply, including organic, only five years after their introduction. No one has any idea who should be liable for health problems and genetic pollution caused by GMOs. In addition to new crop varieties genetic engineering if being used to create new medicines, biological weapons, new bio-based industrial materials and animals with improved commercial features.

Recent actions that have received support from BAN and GAPO include:

May 16, 2001 -Brentwood, California: Antibiotech direct actionists destroy transgenic strawberry, tomato, and onion plants at the DNA Plant Technology research facility.

March 23, 2001 - Oregon State University (OSU), Corvallis: Three GE test sites where poplar and cottonwood trees are being grown by Steve Strauss, a forestry professor and founder of the Tree Genetic Engineering research cooperative, were targeted. In all, over 1200 GE research trees were destroyed.

October 9, 2000 - University of California, Berkeley: Activists calling themselves Green Streets destroy a 1/2 acre test plot of GE corn. This was the fifth action in three years which destroyed corn at UC-Berkeley.

August 26, 2000 - University of California, San Diego: Activists calling themselves the Ninos del Maiz decontaminated one acre of GE maize and the contents of four greenhouses containing rice, maize, arabidopsis, tomatoes, and tobacco.

The crowd of around one hundred listened to impassioned speeches from Canadian canola farmer Percy Schmeiser, as well as other angry farmers from Illinois and Wisconsin, and a scientist from Consumer's Union. GeneWise activists, aided by artists from the radical puppetmaking group Art and Revolution also performed a passionate street theatre drama featuring a retelling of Percy Schmeiser's story using more than a dozen elaborate puppets including a ten-foot tall Schmeiser and a 15-foot tall demon known as the Dark Lord of Monsanto.

GeneWise had signed a contract with the Wyndham Hotel to use a large room right in the middle of the NABC confab. The hotel staff had been working closely with members of GeneWise until less than 24 hours before they were to occupy the room, when a hotel clerk hastily stammered an unlikely story about having rented the room out to another tenant, Novartis, months before. The lie was all the more apparent after spies from GeneWise who had infiltrated the conference remarked that the room was only minimally used as an impromptu lounge for conventioneers.

News of the protest was broadcast on farm reports over dozens of radio and TV stations across North America, and

the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation (CBC) even picked up the protest.

An attendee of the NABC conference, speaking anonymously, admitted that the protesters raised issues that the biotech industry has failed to address. "The industry has relied on the mantras, "this food is safe" and "this food will feed the world." There are no answers coming out of [this conference] to charges of genetic drift, crop contamination, super pests, and the liabilities over personal damages to farmers."

Monsanto Bullies Small Farmers

With Genetically Modified Organisms (GMOs) agricultural supply giants like Monsanto promised farmers high yields with low inputs (industrial fertilizer, pesticide and herbicide — all expensive). On top of the cost of purchasing the seed, farmers had to pay a technology fee — \$7 to \$15 per acre, signifying that they were only leasing the technology from Monsanto, and they had to agree to use only Monsanto chemicals on the crops. They also had to sign a contract promising NOT to save the seed for next year's planting, and not to share, trade or sell any of the seed, all things farmers have done since the dawn of agriculture. They also had to agree to let Monsanto's thugs inspect their land and test their crop for years after the purchase (to see if they had saved seeds) and to inspect their books.

But Monsanto has not just inspected the land and harvest of farmers who purchase their seeds and signed their extortion agreement. They have inspected the fields of farmers who never bought Monsanto seed. If their tests showed positive for GMOs, they sent the farmer a letter threatening to sue them over patent infringement unless the farmer paid them a large fee — \$28,000 is an average — AND agreed never to disclose the terms of the settlement to anyone!

Joe Mendelson an attorney at the Center for Food Safety recently confirmed that Monsanto currently has over 475 cases outstanding against farmers concerning non-payment for usage of genetically engineered seed. What we have to understand about farmers today is that they are desperate and running scared. It's very hard for the average conventional farmer to refuse the promises of these firms or to stand up to their extortion — farmers need your help! www.farmaid.org

Percy "Wise" Schmeiser

Percy Schmeiser is a canola farmer in Bruno, Saskatchewan; Canada. He has been farming canola for over 40 years. He has employed techniques of natural cross breeding to develop a herbicide resistant canola, and he saves his seeds year after year, a tradition practiced by farmers all over the world. In 1997 Monsanto sued him for having their seed on his property. The judge since then has ruled against Schmeiser for patent infringement and he is forced to pay \$105,000 to Monsanto. He has already spent his retirement funds, \$200,000 on his lawsuit. The next day, Schmeiser launched a \$10 million lawsuit against Monsanto, accusing the company of a variety of wrongs, including libel, trespass and contamination of his fields with Roundup Ready. He has since become a folk hero in North America and his mythic resistance is spreading across the American corn belt. www.PercySchmeiser.com

We all sat at a very long table. The purpose of our council was to discuss recent discoveries made about biotech's strategy to counter the world's rising safe food movements. The mood was intoxicated by reports that we had infiltrated their ranks. Listen now, and pull what you can for your purposes, the time for action is at hand.

Biotech has been busy of late securing defenses for a new campaign that will target the consumer. Part of their plan has been to build a base of support within the chains of supermarkets by making "biotech's problem" the food industry's problem. Gene Grabowski, VP, Communications, Grocery Manufacturers of America put it to supermarkets recently this way, "Up to 70% of the processed food that's now in the supermarket may contain biotech ingredients." He took the room by surprise and shock - these were national retail food outlets and they were concerned. "Every day when we see more news stories on the issue and people speaking out against biotechnology, we have to consider our involvement with biotech foods and whether it's possible to turn back on biotech...we clearly have a stake

in biotechnology."

People at our table quickly put forth ideas for action. "Supermarkets have customer service counters with postcards that are already postmarked. People should be encouraged to fill these out with phone book accuracy demanding that biotech foods not be carried or at least labeled. It gives the public an outlet for action," suggested Pennywise.

Biotech has also been busy securing the ranks of the FDA with their minions. Monsanto and other biotech giants harvest employees from within the FDA. It is also no surprise that the FDA has ex-biotech executives working for them. The industry is well aware that what has saved them from a US revolt on biotech is the strength of the public's belief in the FDA. "Frankenfood and Death Administration," was the common crv around our table - erode the public's trust in

The biotech industry is troubled by the public's perception of them: Grabowski, "One of the problems has been that the advantages of biotech are perceived as going to the farmers and NOT the consumers. That message needs to change." David Stark, VP, Industry Affairs, Monsanto added, "in terms of consumer benefits from biotechnology, we found that there are three main messages that resonate with consumers in the United States. One is the use of less pesticide, the second is the fact that it can help feed the world, and the third that more and better nutrition is better for people."

Gary Breissinger, VP, global customer business development, Procter & Gamble, summed it up

with, "It's hard to worry about world hunger and farm subsidies when "what's in it for me" is the basis of consumer marketing. What's in it for the consumer? Whether it's an articulated need that they recognize today or an unarticulated need that has yet to be discovered - that's the crux of the proposition. It seems to me that the industry has not found the one unarticulated need that's going to resonate with consumers and MAKE them say, yes, I want that because the benefits are more valuable than what I perceive to be the risks associated with biotechnology." Monsanto has set loose upon the land an army of PR flaks to find the "one unarticulated need" of the consumer, that one "concept of the gene" that will give them total control.

Since January 1998, 11 homes have been torched near the Phoenix Mountains Preserve and the McDowell Sonoran Preserve in Scottsdale, Arizona. The total damage is estimated at more than \$5 million.

After months of relative silence since the last preserve arson in January, police arrested Mark Sands on April 20. It is alleged that Sands defaced a sign at a construction site near an unfinished house which had previously been burned twice. Police witnessed Sands writing "CSP" on the sign, and he was arrested at his house

shortly thereafter. CSP is known as the Coalition to Save the Preserves and has claimed responsibility for the preserve arsons in a protest against urban sprawl.

Authorities have been careful to not label Sands a suspect, rather stating that anyone arrested at midnight in the neighborhoods near the preserves would be considered an "investigative lead." Sands was questioned for 12 hours before being released.

Neighbors say Sands was aware of police surveillance in the area and had told them he spoke with an undercover officer stationed near his house. They question why he would deface the sign when he knew the police were watching.

In an unusual move, Sands' initial appearance was closed to the public at the request of the Phoenix Police Department. After being released on condition that he must check in with a pre-trial services officer and stay away, from the scene of the crime, his preliminary hearing was canceled. No criminal charges against Sands have been filed at this time.

Sources close to the investigation suggest that all is not free and clear for Sands just yet. The authorities, in this case a collaborative effort between the FBI, Phoenix Police and Fire Departments, are still questioning his neighbors, friends and family members.

bors, friends and family members. Hardly a poster boy of the radical environmental movement, the news media was abuzz after Sands arrest, speculating what an unlikely suspect he makes. Sands is a 49-year-old selfemployed marketing consultant who also serves as the vice president of a Phoenix neighborhood association. He worked as a spokesperson for the Arizona Department of Education in the mid-'90s and later with two different health care organizations. Sands is active in a Bible study group, and his only public crusade has been an attempt to purchase new playground equipment in his neighborhood. He lives near the **Phoenix Mountains Preserve and likes** to use the hiking trails.

Kenyans Clash Over Threatened Forests

In early May, a skirmish on the edge of the Kaptagat Forest in central Kenya saw a man lash his whip down hard on a youth wearing a "Save our Forests" t-shirt. Soon a mob started throwing rocks at a busload of environmental activists from Kenya's Green Belt Movement, trying to keep them from reaching a patch of threatened woodland. After a rock smashed a window, and blood streamed from a passenger's head, the busload of visitors headed elsewhere to expose forest destruction. This was just one battle in a much larger dispute fighting to preserve what is left of Kenya's forests.

The conflict peaked when the government issued a plan in February to log seven percent of Kenya's total forest cover to house landless farmers.

"There's something that the administration there is hiding," said Green Belt activist Wangari Maathai. "We are dealing with very corrupt and greedy people."

"It's not even corruption like stealing from the bank, this is stealing from the present and from the future," said Maathai. The mob that attacked the Green Belt bus shouted at visitors that the forest was a zone reserved for KANU the party that has ruled Kenya since independence in 1963. Maathai bears no grudge against the mob, instead directing her ire against politicians she said hired the men to keep their exploitation of the forest a secret.

ELF Burns Ross Island Sand and Gravel Cement Trucks in Portland

The April 15 arson of two cement trucks was claimed by the Earth Liberation Front (ELF). In their communique the ELF warns, "If Ross Island Sand and Gravel mines in the Columbia River Gorge, then the ELF will take necessary action. Let this be a warning to all the greedy corporations who exploit our Earth's natural resources, especially those who do it under the FTAA and the title of 'free trade'."

In recent years Ross Island Sand and Gravel have made headlines in Oregon for their environmentally destructive practices, including the dredging of toxic disposal cells. The ELF communiqué continued, "In their Easter basket we decided to leave four containers with gasoline and a time-delayed fuse placed under two of their cement trucks."

It is summer. Each day as the sun burns bright, the warmth moves to higher places. Little by little, the mountain soil releases more moisture, nurturing nature's wonders. The forest is not quiet; it is alive with sound and movement. Millions of songs fill the air-birds, insects, the wind on the treetops and the gushing streams-all playing their melodies by the rhythm of the Earth. Nothing is lost here, nothing is taken without being returned. The largest creatures give back to the smallest. Everything here, right down to the last drop of water, the most hidden spider, the smallest patch of lichen, takes its part in the great cycle. Between these sounds, this chorus of life, there is another phenomenon permeating every nook and cranny in the universe. It too can be heard, but one must listen well.

It is the silence.

Today it is very quiet. The silence is broken by only faint whispers. As the day grows hotter, the silence grows thicker. What is wrong? Where are we? Is this a dream? No, this is the Gros Ventre range of Wyoming. And today, every creature is intently listening because they have never heard this sound before. Far off it comes-plodding, thumping, churning and banging: Metallic beasts of destruction have entered the lower hills and are slowly, but steadily, inching their way up Little Granite Creek, smashing, killing, laying waste, devouring everything in the way.

Oh, they have done this elsewhere.

What was once virgin wilderness, thriving with nature's abundance, is now scarred and festering, riddled with cancerous tumors of the humans' making. Like a patient, infected with cancer, the malignancy only grows larger and more lethal. Before enough antibodies can come to the defense, the organism is dying.

But, as it has been said, life is tough and death is easy. The noise at the bottom of the mountain gets louder. As it does, millions of heartbeats on the mountain quicken. An old grizzly bear suddenly gives up trying to catch her fat trout and disappears into thicker cover. All around the path of the invaders, animals scatter to seek refuge, much like they do when a fire comes. Unlike fires, however, the noisy clamoring bulldozers are relentless: They

Korean Environmentalist Employs Treesit

Park Yong-shin shouts, "Stop destroying the forest" at a Korea Land Corporation's (Koland) construction site. From a treesit perch, eight meters off the ground, Park hopes to stop development on Mount Daeji by Koland. Park is an activist with the Citizens' Movement for Environmental Justice.

After building a hut in the tree with a wooden board, Park moved in on April 29. He says that he will continue his protest until Koland promises to cancel the entire development project and preserve nearly 40,000 square meters of forest on Mount Daeji.

Anniversary of Brazilian Massacre Marked by Protests

Across Brazil, nationwide protests marked the fifth anniversary of one of Brazil's bloodiest land disputes. On April 17, 1996, police clashed with nearly 2,000 landless peasants in the eastern Amazon town of Eldorado dos Carajas, killing 19 and wounding 69. Although 156 policemen were indicted for the killings, only three officers have gone to trial—and were acquitted for lack of evidence. The verdict later was overturned. A new trial is expected next month.

"Landless workers are renewing their offensive against the government," said Joao Pedro Stedile, a leader of the movement. More than 1,000 Brazilians have lost their lives in land disputes over the past decade, according to the Land Pastoral, a Roman Catholic group that advocates land reform.

In the northeastern city of Recife, protesters planted 19 crosses in a grassy downtown area to honor the victims of Eldorado dos Carajas. Hundreds of workers marched through the downtown financial district in São Paulo. Some waved flags and banners that read: "Massacre—Never Again." A bridge linking Brazil to Argentina was briefly blocked by hundreds of farmworkers in the far southern city of Uruguaiana, where protests were also held outside the local offices of Italian dairy giant Parmalat against food imports and excessive profits for multinational companies.

In the midwestern city of Campo Grande, protesters broke windows and threw eggs at a McDonald's restaurant, a favorite symbol of a globalized economy. keep coming and will do so until they reach a pristine, alpine saddle, far up on the mountain. There, they will bring up other weapons to tear a deep hole out of the life-giving Earth. Like a hideous vampire, this mechanized bloodsucker will stab deep into the soil and rock in search of the decayed remains of creatures long gone.

Once oil is found, the pumps will pull from the Earth as much oil and gas as is demanded by the desperate power-mongers in charge of the invading machinery.

Thousands of miles away, in a vinyl and chrome-plated toilet stall, an insidious shell of what was once a being resembling the human variety, will let off an extra cackle or two, as he, James G. Watt, muses over his "divine" duty, and tomorrow will call the rape of the Gros Ventre "wise management."

Like a nasty nightmare, all of this could happen, but here's the pinch: It won't, because there are now enough concerned, fed-up and active humans, who are loosely united under one banner (not a national one, but a planetary one), who are drawn to that strong impulse and concern: the Earth's survival. We are not, and the Earth is not, alive because of profits first, nor because of power first, greed first, progress first or war first—we are alive due to the Earth first—always have been, always will be. We are Earth First!ers! The survival of this one and only planet we have is what counts.

There have always been people like us, but our voices have often been scattered and muzzled. Now we are

coming out of the woodwork, as it were. We need no convincing, no one has to give us sermons, or tell us what to think and do. The score is pretty damn obvious. Our planet is being destroyed by humans, so it must be saved by humans. If we don't save her, who will?

Twenty-Eight Rabbits Rescued from California Lab

The Animal Liberation Front (ALF) has claimed responsibility for liberating 28 rabbits from a vivisection lab in Castroville, California. ICRC Company was targeted in the early morning hours of April 28, marking the end of World Week for Animals in Laboratories.

The raid operated under the cover of darkness to rescue the animals. In a communiqué released by the ALF Press Office, the activists described how they cut through a perimeter fence, avoided motion detector sensors and broke into the facility while the caretakers were watching television in a building next door.

ALF spokesperson David Barbarash concurred with the ALF activists that these rabbits "live their lives in agony and are then murdered under the guise of 'science'."

"Whether this lab is conducting toxicology experiments for chemicals and pesticides, or whether they are conducting medical or psychological research, experimenting on sentient animals is abhorrent and immoral," stated Barbarash.

Vancouver Teddy Bear Direct Action

On May 4, approximately 25 teddy bears, supported by a dozen humans, held a teddy bear picnic in the offices of the Department of Foreign Affairs and International Trade (DFAIT) in downtown Vancouver, British Columbia. They were part of an affinity group known as the Vancouver Teddy Bear Brigade.

The direct action teddy bears arrived complete with a miniature, yet functional, catapult, which launched the smaller bears through the air. It was a festive yet serious picnic. They clarified to the employees present that they were nonviolent and were not upset at them as people, just at DFAIT and the judicial system.

The teddy bears demanded the immediate release of the six political prisoners still in jail in Quebec City as a result of the Summit of the Americas. One of the prisoners, Jaggi Singh, was violently kidnapped off the street by cops disguised as "protesters" who threw him in a mini van. The police accused him of being in possession of weapon for dangerous purposes, a weapon that was in fact a giant catapult used to throw teddy bears over the infamous Quebec City Wall, with which Singh had no link whatsoever.

This was the bears first nonviolent direct action, but the teddy bears announced, "We will be back!"

My medicine chest is a council of bioregions, with representatives gathered together as I make my way around the world west of the Rocky Mountains. The coptis root was picked out of the churned-up scar left by an excavator, at the retreating edge of the Idaho wilderness. The tiny amount of pipsissewa leaves came from an ancient grove above the Klamath River just feet away from where the district ranger sat on a stump talking about his plans to cut it all down. I am drying nettles from the California creek where salmon die in the silt left after a century of industrial logging.

Every jar holds a story—often a ghost story of dying ecosystems and places gone forever. I am honored to have known the plants in their homes and to have studied their uses as medicine. But for people not inclined to roam throughout the wilds, purchased herbal preparations such as tinctures may be the link back to this sort of healing.

Like so much in this consumerist society, it is easy to ignore the connections between a bottle on a store's shelf and a living, growing plant out in the world somewhere. It can be hard to know if the plant grows a mile away or

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on another continent. There is much to be said for reconnecting, for educating ourselves about the herbs we use and for gathering our own medicine when we can. That's how we will be able to build a new system of healing one that can support our movement away from the corporate power structure that medicine has become.

The development of a new medical system, or the recovery of ancient models, will be another link in our safety net when industrialism fails. It will keep us alive and kicking out windows. Many people don't even have access to industrial medicine. Anarcho-herbalism will re-establish our connection to the real medicine that is the Earth.

An Alternative to "Alternative Medicine"

The sort of herbal medicine popular these days—presented to us by the media and so-called green capitalists as yet another exciting fad has brought with it very few thoughts on a new way of healing. The plants, reduced to capsule form or, worse, to their "active ingredients," are just new tools to work with in the same body-machine that industrial medicine sees people as being. They become no different than pharmaceutical drugs or a scalpel blade: something with which to pry into the body-machine and use to mess around with the parts—only much less effective because the herbs have been taken out of the system of healing in which they have their strength.

When the marketers of herbal products get their hands on a new "miracle cure," it can mean extinction for the plant. This is especially sad when so many living creatures go into useless products or are wasted on conditions that they don't treat. The classic example of this is goldenseal, Hydrastis canadensis-a plant close to extinction in the wild. It has a couple of amazing actions in the human body but has mostly been marketed as a cure for the common cold, which it will do almost nothing to help. Unsurprisingly, the largest brokers of wild-harvested goldenseal and many other big-name herbs are multinational pharmaceutical corporations. Given American society's obsession with herbal Viagra, weight loss pills and stimulants, most of the herbs on the mass market are being sacrificed to ridiculous causes.

There is an alternative to "alternative medicine." Southwestern herbalist, author and teacher Michael Moore probably said it best: "In this country, the herb business mostly revolves around recently marketed substances with new research, and it comes from them to us. Whereas we're trying to establish as much as possible-in this "lower level" if you will-the fact that we need to create a practice and a model that's impervious to faddism. We're trying to practice in a way that derives from practice rather than from marketing. Not from above to below but from below around. Bioregionalism über alles. Keep it local. No centralization because centralization kills everything."

Herbo-primitivism

We need another way of looking at our bodies and the plant medicines. Seeing the two as interconnected and in balance is new to industrial culture, but in reality it is the most ancient healing model on Earth. We knew it before we were people. Animals know how to use plants to medicate themselves. Their examples surround us, from dogs eating grass to bears digging osha roots. Probably every human society has had some way of explaining how the body works

and how plant medicines work in us. One thing all herbalists know-dogs and bears included-is that a health problem is best treated before it begins. In more primitive societies where people have the luxury of listening to their own bodies, it is easy to spot an imbalance before it turns into an acute disease state. This is where herbs are most effective. They work at this subclinical level of "imbalances" and "deficiency" and "excess." This is subtle and requires a lot of self-knowledge or at least self-awareness. It uses intuition as a diagnostic tool. Emotion, spirituality and environment become medicines. The spirit and environment of the plants we gather affects their healing properties, and our relationship with those plants becomes very important.

Green Herbology

When we take herbal medicine, we are taking in part of a plant's environment. Everything it ate, drank and experienced has formed the medicine you're depending on, so you better make sure it gets all the best. When we are healed by plants, we owe it to them to look out for their kind and the places where they live. Traditional plant-gatherers often have a prayer they recite before they take anything from the wild. Our modern prayer should be a promise to defend



the plant when it needs it. This true herbal healing system has at its heart a deep commitment to the Earth.

The bioregional concept is important to this model of healing. Plants' actions in our bodies are really quite limited by the chemicals they can produce from sunlight and soil. For every big-name herb on the market cut from the rainforest or dug from the mountains, there is most likely a plant with a similar action growing in your watershed. Some of the best medicines to maintain good health grow in vacant lots and neglected gardens around the world.

Anarcho-herbalism

A society of people who are responsible for their own

health and able to gather or grow their own medicines is a hard society to rule. These days we are dependent on the power structure of industrial health care-the secret society of doctors, white-male-dominated medical schools, corporate decision makers with their toxic pharmaceuticals and labs full of tortured beings. That dependence is one more thing keeping us tied to the state and unable to rebel with all our hearts or to even envision a world without such oppression. With a new system of healing, based on self-knowledge and herbal wisdom, we will be that much more free. Offering a real alternative health care system will help to calm some people's fears about returning to an anarchistic, Earth-centered way of life. There is a false security in the men with big machines, ready to put you back together again if you have enough money. What is ignored is the fact that industrial society causes most of the dis-eases that people fear. Living free on a healing Earth while surrounded by true community and eating real food will prove to be a better medicine than anything you can buy.

What steps can we make toward creating this new system of medicine? We all need to learn what we can about our own health. This can be through training in one or more of the surviving models of traditional healing and/or through self-observation. How do you feel when you're just starting to get a cold? What kinds of

problems come up repeatedly, especially when you're stressed out? If you're a women, how long is your cycle and what does the blood look like? Understanding how our bodies act in times of health can help us recognize the very early stages of disease when herbs are the most useful.

People who have some background in healing (in the traditional or industrial systems) can be a great help to those of us just learning. Healers who are working to form this new model, whether collectively or through their individual practices, should keep in mind that commitment to the Earth and a decentralized form are central to truly revolutionary medicine.

In these times of change, everything is being examined and either destroyed, rebuilt or created from our hearts. Industrialism has affected every aspect of our lives-we are just starting to realize how much has been lost. Medicine is just one part of the machine that we have to take back and recreate into a form that works for the society we will become. Every herb, pill and procedure should be judged on its sustainability and accessibility to small groups of people. We can start with ourselves, within our communities and circles, but we should never stop expanding outwards until industrial medicine rusts in a forgotten grave, a victim of its own imbalances.

We abhor violence but will meet it head on. Be assured that these actions are well planned and financed. You will be soundly defeated in this type of conflict with us.

We will not identify ourselves or take credit for our

actions. We will actively seek your demise, incarceration and to discredit your group and members. We will work with law enforcement to further enhance our reach. We will actively increase our membership, budget, and technology until you are vanquished.

You have been given fair and adequate warning. On behalf of freedom loving capitalists and starving people everywhere, we conclude this communication. —YAKIR OSMOFF

Comment on your fine essay:

Years ago, as a young activist in Eugene, Oregon (early 70's), I, too, was stunned by some of the inequities in personal dynamics among people who claimed to be social change agents and somewhat beyond reproach. I remember a meeting in which I had had enough of some of this hypocrisy and publicly declared I was through with "the community," at which time I went back to school, became an apartment manager, and attempted to meld back into the so-called establishment.

I have never been terribly comfortable living within a capitalistic society, though I have been successful at it. In my early 50's I have been trying to return to my early roots, which is hard to do when you have multiple family obligations, some property to manage, age-related health issues etc. You will not understand until you get there. In any case, I certainly don't want to discourage young activists in their efforts to defend the rapidly eroding natural world, just send this caveat: we are all human beings, and certainly flawed by at least a couple hundred years of an industrial society that has pitted the rich against the poor, the powerful against the weak. In addition, we are, at base,

just animals with a "superior" intellect who, like most species, are opportunistic including within our close knit communities where we may even feel *safer* to be opportunistic. (Even in "straight" society most rapes and abuse occurs within families that we profess to love or which profess to love us).

I agree that we, as flawed humans, should sit around and try to root out the problems but I don't agree that an activist "interloper" should be thought terribly less of for an indiscretion such as this. He/she should be educated, and temporarily shamed, perhaps. What does "straight" society do to people like this-lock them up without any real rehabilitation (especially in California), and then parole them years later with a couple hundred bucks in their pockets to start a "new" life (who will hire them?). We can do better. The alternative community can do much better, and if we do we will reveal to the entire world that we are not on the wrong side of the political spectrum.

NY Rendezvous continued

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Next we had an anti-sexist workshop for men. This is a developing movement in the activist community in NYC. We created a safe space for people to speak openly about our own sexist behavior and develop creative solutions for destroying sexism.

We moved to another threatened garden, *La Plaza Cultural*, for a large-scale play organized by the community. Climbing trainings went on in magnificent willow trees that crown the community space. We ended the evening with music and festivities in a squat just down the block.

Ourfinalplanned day was spent in the South Bronx, one of the poorest communities in the US, hit hard

by pollution from highways, waste transfer stations, sewage treatment plant, incinerator smoke and power plants, but also home to more than 100 community gardens and countless lots gone wild.

In a small inlet next to the largest scrap metal yard in NYC is the restored Hunt's Point Riverside Park on the Bronx River. We navigated it in a boat built by local high school students. We rowed the length of the mammoth Hunt's Point Market, where more than 20,000 trucks per day drop food from far away. The market is dubbed the worst ecological disaster in the city. We navigated the rotting skeletons of pier pilings getting sucked back to the depths by a renewed burst of gribbles and shipworms. Riker's Island prison and a monolith steel prison barge, opened for overflow in Mayor Giuliani's time, came into view near a break in the endless seawall where cordgrass flourishes despite decades of subjugation.

Throughout the day, the Cherry Tree Association hosted a restoration of a marina reclaimed from city neglect. The NYPD sometimes uses the space as

This gathering was an attempt to highlight rampant environmental racism, failures of urban planning and to bring disparate communities together, bioregionally, to further radicalize people in the communities that feel the brunt of the urban environmental blight.

> a firing range and it is directly adjacent to a brand new power plant construction site. Stiff competition, but squatting land was never easy.

> We ended the evening cooking over an open fire in the Cherry Tree Garden and listening to Dr. Paul Makiewicz of the Gaia Institute about their efforts to use indigenous plants and so-called waste products to restore the watershed and intertidal marshes. "NYC is

an environmental disaster or an incredible opportunity spitting us in the face. We don't need to abandon the city, we need to rebuild it."

The next day a group of activists paid a surprise visit to the NYC offices of Governor George Pataki. This was a protest against the construction of 10 power plants in poor communities in NYC. The quasi-public New York Power Authority (NYPA) pushed through the plan, just below the size requiring a full Environmental Impact Review—which would have forced public comment and appropriate biological studies. The plants will emit thousands of tons of sulfur dioxide, carbon mon-

oxide, particulate matter, nitrogen oxides and volatile organic compounds such as benzopyrenes and formaldehyde per year. The construction is being rushed to pre-empt court

cases that have already been filed. In the week following the gathering there was a huge rally to save community gardens and a protest to end the bombing in Vieques at the United Nations with 28 people arrested.

Two months later (hours after her release) the judge found Drea guilty of two counts of interfering with logging equipment and found an additional activist guilty of one charge of interfering and one charge of a closure violation. Locust received six months, with two months time served, and he is in Sea-Tac Federal Detention Center until August 4 (check the Earth Liberation Prisoner list for more information).

Despite all this madness, there's no good reason to stay away from Idaho! It is beautiful here, and we fully intend to remain vigilant in our defense of the largest contiguous roadless area in the lower 48 states. Join Wild Rockies Earth First! this summer on a direct action tour of the threats facing our bioregion.

June 25-July 4: Otter-Wing and Mackey Day Timber Sales, Central Idaho. We will be doing extensive field assessments on the effects of logging from last winter in the area, as well as doing direct action if necessary. We will also be looking at the Slate Creek Roadless area, where the freddies are planning a massive "restoration project" (i.e. timber sale). This activity represents the first use of the loopholes present in the now tenuous roadless policy.

July 5-July 18: Earth First! National Rendezvous, Tetons, Wyoming. We will help set up the site and participate in actions aimed at oil and gas leases in the Tetons—A top priority of the Bush Administration's misguided energy policy.

July 19-25: Boise-Cascade Corporation, Boise, Idaho. The company is responsible for ecosystem destruction and genocide of indigenous people worldwide. Boise Cascade is also the lead plaintiff in a lawsuit opposing the US Government's roadless protection policy.

July 25-August 15: Rock Creek Mine, northwest Montana. This mine is in the final Environmental Impact Statement stage and could be implemented as early as this summer. The mine would go under the Cabinet-Yak wilderness area. The location of the mine facilities is in a critical area of grizzly bear habitat.

August 16-September 16: Bitterroot National Forest, Montana. This project is on a fast track and could be implemented this fall. The purpose calls for the logging of 65,000 acres yielding 180-million board feet and the reconstruction of 600 miles of logging road to modern industrial standards.

September 17-October 10: Stone Container Pulp Factory, French Town, Montana. Stone is one of the worst polluters in the Northern Rockies ecosystem, and we will serve notice that this is no longer acceptable.

ENRON's Lou Pai Invades Colorado

The *La Sierra* community in the northern Sangre de Cristo mountains of Colorado's San Luis Valley is the scene of one of the state's longest running water and land rights struggles. The 1848 Treaty of Hidalgo was intended to protect Chicano farmers' rights in San Luis, but the US government has generally ignored the residents.

La Sierra, formerly known as the Taylor Ranch, and its watershed provide the lifeblood of the San Luis communities. The ranch was recently bought by Lou Pai, a major stockholder and CEO of ENRON corporation—one of the largest energy corporations in the world.

Since purchasing the property, Lou Pai has waged an aggressive campaign to acquire more property in the area. He prefers strong-arm tactics such as: blocking irrigation ditches, fencing off property next to the ranch and claiming it as his own, having people arrested for trespassing while clearing out irrigation ditches and beating one 60-year-old farmer with a shovel. Calling the police is not a good idea in this area—many of the sheriffs work part-time at the ranch.

On March 10, more than 200 activists and local farmers marched to Lou Pai's headquarters on the south end of the ranch. At the gates, activist and filmmaker Sabin Potillo yelled out, "People need to be made aware of what's going on, it's time to move forward and stand together."

Community dialog is ongoing and the people of San Luis are building bridges between anti-globalists, environmentalists and radical Chicanos. Working together, everyone is learning to speak the same language.

No Star Wars! Activists Invade Vandenberg





On Armed Forces Day, May 19, 300 protesters faced off with US Space Command troops, water cannons and special forces officers as helicopter gunships circled overhead. This protest at Vandenberg Air Force Base in California drew attention to the military's involvement in Star Wars, satellite direction of defoliation aircraft in Colombia, support for corporate globalization and worldwide surveillance. Military satellites and nuclear test missiles are regularly

launched from Vandenberg, the largest Space Command facility in the world.

In an action similar to the bombing range occupations on Vieques, Puerto Rico, two dozen members of the Vandenberg Action Coalition infiltrated deep into the base's security zones at the sprawling 98,000-acre facility. Banners were hung from satellite tracking dishes and one group managed to get a banner onto a military communications tower on top of a mountain. Only 10 of the backwoods protesters were arrested. They face double trespass and conspiracy charges. Two Catholic Worker activists from Los Angeles were still in jail days after their arrests for participating in the backcountry security zone occupation.

Altogether 37 people were arrested the week of May 19, bringing the total up to 72 arrests at Vandenberg so far this year. Organizers are calling for another massive demonstration on October 13.

NORWAY PURSUES WOLF GENOCIDE PROGRAM

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By making the *de facto* exclusion of wolves from most of the country a cornerstone in their management policy, the government implicitly hammers home the message that the wolf is by definition a "problem" that has to be limited. Here the department officials argue that the zoning is necessary to avoid conflicts and that it is also a prerequisite to acceptance of wolves in Norway.

This reasoning is doubtful to say the least, since the limitation of wolves' living areas can no more be expected to lead to greater acceptance of wolves than the principle of Apartheid contributed to the increased acceptance of and respect for black people in South Africa. There is another parallel: Like the former Apartheid, the wolf zone model in Norway is a result of hatred and prejudice.

The worst thing that can happen is that the present zone principle continues to be adhered to. This is because people will become accustomed to the thought that wolves must not be allowed a free existence. Thus, unless the friends of the wolf manage to bring about an abandonment of the concept of severe limitation of the wolves' areas, the Norwegian wolf management zones are likely to serve a very negative educational function. As long as the current Norwegian management model persists, the wolf is prevented from being a natural element in the fauna. It seems that the government's aim is to pay lip service to protection of the wolf, while avoiding the accompanying responsibility for accepting the wolves' natural right to form and sustain a viable population. The present management strategy has been likened to a sort of "wilderness zoo" in which a small population is maintained and assisted by the regular artificial introduction of genetically-foreign wolves into the small population of animals whose genetic variability would otherwise rapidly dwindle and become too small for survival.

What can people in Norway and abroad do about this? Several strategies will have to be used. The informative line has to be accompanied by direct and spectacular actions that can catch people's attention, since the majority of people seem to be undecided and cling to what they believe is a "neutral" attitude. Since Norway is an attractive country for tourists from around the world, it certainly would have an effect if the government sees that their wolf management principles will reflect badly upon the country abroad. I therefore call upon you all to bring out the message about what our management authorities are doing. At the same time, there are people inside Norway who are preparing for the upcoming fight to prevent the slaughter of the remaining wolf pack in Oesterdalen, a slaughter that the sheep farmers have already been promised.

CRACKING DAMS ACTIVISTS PUSH DECOMMISSIONING AGENDA

On June 5, 1976 the Teton Dam broke, and for a short time the river was free again.

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By 11 a.m., two of the dozers were swallowed into the pit just as a large whirlpool formed in the reservoir behind the dam. At 11:57 a.m., the face of the dam collapsed.

Wilford resident Elaine Johnson later wrote, "Suddenly the Western third of the dam disintegrated. One witness said the wall of water seemed to hang in the air for a second, then come crashing down the canyon. An estimated 80 billion gallons of water was loose and headed for the Upper Snake River Valley. By evening, the reservoir had drained completely."

Dramatically, with the loss of 11 lives, millions of dollars in damage and the destruction of several communities, the first large BuRec dam was decommissioned—before it could deliver a drop of subsidized water to the potato and alfalfa farmers who had pressured Congress to fund the project.

For the first time, intense scrutiny was brought on an agency that had for years been one of the most popular and respected in the federal government. As a result of questions raised in Congress about the reliability of other BuRec dams, new laws were passed and safety programs put in place that required periodic reviews and inspections of all dams throughout the US. The agency worked hard to repair its damaged reputation and succeeded, in part, by persuading Congress to put it in charge of reviewing itself.

The failure of the Teton Dam 25 years ago remains a matter of great embarrassment to BuRec, certainly a chapter in the agency's 99-year history it would rather forget. But BuRec has an even bigger anniversary coming up next year, the centennial of the federal reclamation program and there's a lot of history looking back in the mirror at the agency's brass and public relations flacks. The picture is not quite as pretty as they would have us believe.

Resist! If Resistance is Not Enough, Then Subvert!

Five years after the Teton Dam failure, another major crack in the BuRec dam portfolio occurred—only this time

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the damage was symbolic. On the vernal equinox of 1981, a small crowd of activists gathered at the Carl Hayden Visitor Center at Glen Canyon Dam. Author Ed Abbey stood in the parking lot, exhorting the group to, "Resist, subvert, delay, until the system self-destructs." Meanwhile, a scruffy-looking group of characters climbed a fence on the other side of the visitor center, hauling a large roll of black plastic out onto the crest of the dam.

This was history in the making, at least as far as the environmental movement is concerned. That brisk March morning was the first meeting of Ed Abbey and several of the founders of the Earth First! movement. The event was captured for posterity on film and later produced as a short documentary. Earth First! co-founders Dave Foreman, Bart Koehler and others ambled out onto the dam where they proceeded to unfurl the long sheet of plastic down the face of the dam, appearing to form a long, narrow black "crack."

This innovative incident became an instant classic, all the more so because BuRec has since beefed up security measures at the dam, making it all but impossible for such a stunt to be carried out today. As far as actions go, this was one that is unlikely to be matched in the future.

The crack in Glen Canyon Dam may have been the only "banner hang" ever perpetrated on a BuRec facility and in that respect certainly earns a place in the direct action history books. From the agency's perspective, the action was little more than a distant blip on a radar screen. Despite the romantic "Monkey Wrench Gang" rhetoric, the action presented little threat to the agency's power. The event would, however, foreshadow a movement nearly 20 years later—that would challenge BuRec on a number of dams throughout the basin.

Can Adaptive Management Save the Grand Canyon?

In 1996, the late David Brower publicly called for decommissioning Glen Canyon Dam. The "Archdruid" sparked a flame that has ignited a movement to uncover the many sacred sites and the 250 miles of majestic canyons of the Glen and the San Juan River. In the last year of his life, Brower co-founded the Glen Canyon Action Network and attended a rally at the dam where several hundred activists from around the country gathered to call for decommissioning a number of BuRec dams, including Glen Canyon (see *EF!J* May-June 2000).

That rally, on the third annual International Day of Action Against Dams, marked the beginning of a grassroots organizing campaign to bring together people from all walks of life to begin the work of restoring rivers.

One of the concerns driving the Colorado River restoration movement is the recovery of native fish that are on the endangered species list. Predation by introduced fish and the destruction of habitat by dams and water diversions are the chief culprits of the decline of these species. Endangered fish are extirpated in many river reaches and in many areas of the reservoirs. The government's response has been to support "adaptive management" for the river reaches below the dams.

The Grand Canyon Adaptive Management Program (GCAMP) is the most prominent such effort. Set up in 1996 by former Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt as a stakeholder collaborative group, the GCAMP includes federal and state agency personnel, power interests and representatives from environmental and recreation groups. The GCAMP has avoided any serious discussion of the possibility of removing Glen Canyon Dam, in part because the official stakeholder representatives do not seem to want to examine the issue. The conclusion of five years of research and monitoring in the Grand Canyon seems to be that more studies are needed before any substantive action might be taken. BuRec's management options are extremely limited, given the lack of institutional will to address the dam itself. At best, flows and water temperature downstream of the dam can be manipulated to more closely mimic the natural flow/temperature regime. But even that, as well thought out as it might be, cannot substitute for the loss of vital nutrients and sediments that are trapped in Lake Powell Reservoir, never reaching the Grand Canyon. Large dams create insurmountable barriers to fish migration and render unusable long stretches of critical riverine habitat.

BuRec intends to initiate adaptive management strategies at other dams in the basin such as Flaming Gorge on the Utah-Wyoming border and Navajo Dam on the San Juan River. Draft Environmental Impact Statements (EIS) are in preparation for these structures and are expected later this year. Activists are calling on the agency to include analyses of dam decommissioning alternatives in the EIS.

Adaptive management, without benchmark analysis and evaluation of a wide spectrum of alternatives including decommissioning, is little more than a fancy monitoring program. How much longer will the program continue without getting any results? At some point, different protocols must be tried. And those should include a scientifically valid study with decommissioning as an alternative.

Last Call for Reservoirs

Just when you thought it was safe to go back out on the rivers, a proposal has appeared for yet another dam in the Colorado River basin.

Last fall, Congress passed a law authorizing construction of the Animas-La Plata (A-LP) reservoir project, a spectacular boondoggle planned for the Animas River near Durango, Colorado. The Animas is the last free-flowing tributary of the San Juan River. If A-LP is built, it will probably be the last project of any size that BuRec builds, as well as the most uneconomical and unworkable. Sufficient water does not exist in the river to fulfill the purposes of the project. The reservoir site includes a former uranium tailings pile and is contaminated with heavy metals. Environmentalists have threatened a lawsuit that could tie the project up in court. Stay tuned.

Meanwhile, the mighty rivers of the Southwest continue to be diverted, the reservoirs evaporate huge amounts of water into the desert skies every day and endangered species continue their slow but steady decline. Activists are organizing, changing the political dynamics and shifting the terms of debate from whether it may make sense to take down some dams to asking how soon the dams will go. The sooner natural flows can be restored to river reaches, the sooner the recovery of the native ecosystem will commence.

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Glen

Looking ahead to the BuRec centennial in 2002, activists are calling for the agency to change its name to the "Bureau of Restoration." Let's make the agency focus in its second century on working to put the pieces of our broken ecosystems back together.

It's been said by many—even Bruce Babbitt himself—that the era of big dam-building is over. If river activists can make their case to the American people, the dam-building orgy of the last 50 years will not only come to an end, but will begin to reverse. In our lifetimes, we may live to see the splendor of majestic canyons restored.

In the case of Glen Canyon Dam, at least, the question now is whether we will be able to initiate a science-driven decommissioning process that will bring back Glen Canyon while protecting Grand Canyon, or whether Mother Nature will do it all at once as in the case of Teton Dam. Either way, we'll get Glen Canyon back, but we would like to do it carefully, with minimal disruption downstream. We hope you'll be with us every step of the way.

continued from page 19 Because of its huge geographical scope, even if it were a benign use of the landscape, it would be a concern.

But it's anything but benign. It is the number one source for water pollution in the West. It's the number one source of soil erosion in the West. It's the number one cause of species endangerment in the West. It's the reason we don't have wolves throughout the West. It's one of the major reasons that more than four-fifths of all native fish west of the Continental Divide

are endangered or threatened. We are facing a biodiversity crisis. While protection of private lands is desirable, it is questionable whether we will ever achieve more than spotty and unsatisfactory results. Our public lands are critical to any effort aimed at protection of biodiversity and as a place where

landscape-scale ecological processes like wildfire and predation can operate. We can grow cows elsewhere if we insist on growing cows anywhere. And there are certainly far better places to do this than our western public lands.

Tim: There is much discussion of the cows vs. condo myth. Some say cows *Page 56 Earth First! Litha 2001*

beget condos. Just what does this mean and is it a legitimate concern?

George: Cows vs. condos refers to a false dichotomy that believes if you eliminatelivestock production, particularly on public lands, you will foster greater sprawl and development. Many environmentalists, as well as the live-

> stock industry itself, suggest that the way to protect open space is to protect the livestock industry. There are several problems with this strategy.

> Most of us live in cities or towns that are growing. The West is one of the fastest-growing parts of the country due to net in-migration. It is only natural to

assume that sprawl is necessarily worse than livestock production. It is something that we all experience everyday. Most of us don't directly experience the negative effects of livestock on a daily basis. So this colors our perception of the issue.

On an acre-by-acre comparison, sprawl and urban development is highly destructive and probably far more damaging than having some cows munching on weeds-it's not a fair comparison. The amount of land directly affected by sprawl and development is actually quite small. But I don't want anyone to accuse me of saying that sprawl isn't a problem. Where it occurs it is a problem and it needs to be controlled, guided or even kept from occurring at all. Where I differ from others is that I believe we need to control, guide or eliminate livestock production as well as sprawl. Neither is good for ecosystems or native species. It's not a choice of one or the other. We should be fighting both.

If you added in the effects of farming—and most of the agricultural land in the US is used to grow crops ultimately fed to livestock, not consumed directly by humans—livestock production is responsible for more endangered species than any other human activity, including urbanization.

Livestock production affects nearly 70 to 75 percent of the entire US. That includes the public and private rangeland used for grazing, the lands

used for crop production like hay or corn and the lands used as pasture. It's a huge amount of land. By comparison urbanization only affects three percent of the US land area. So if you are talking about total ecological impacts, the effects of livestock production are far greater than sprawl simply based on geographical scales.

In California, only four percent of the landscape is developed according to analysis of aerial photos. I find the statistics compelling. I know that may be difficult to believe if you are living in Los Angeles

or the San Francisco bay area, but think again. You have millions of acres in the desert, up in the Sierra Nevada and along the North Coast that is virtually uninhabited. Much of this is public land—half of California is public land and will never be developed. Even most of the agricultural lands are used for livestock production—with hay and pasture accounting for more crop acreage than any other crops grown in the state.

When you look at other western states it is even more skewed towards livestock—for instance 95 percent of Montana has less than four people per square mile. That's frontier by the 1890 US census definition. Yes, there are some crowded and growing areas of the state but these make up a small amount of the total—some 0.17 percent of the state's total land area. Most of Montana's nonforested land is used for agricultural production, including livestock. So most of the West is dominated by open space, not urbanization or sprawl.

Open space isn't necessarily good for wildlife or ecosystem protection. If that were the case, then Montana would not have any endangered species. There would be bison, wolves, grizzlies and sage grouse everywhere—but these species are on the verge of extinction.

Why? Because of sprawl? Hardly. Because of agriculture—primarily livestock production.

Even if you don't agree with me that livestock production is the greatest contributor to biological impoverishment, that doesn't mean that ranching can preserve open space. The only effective way to preserve open space is through zoning, purchase of development rights or outright purchase of land.

The problem with the cows vs. condos myth is that it saps public support for alternatives. If people think we can have our cake and eat it too—i.e. having ranching and the Cowboy Myth preserved and not have to cough up money for land acquisition or debate about zoning issues, they are going to avoid biting the bullet and seriously discussing these proven alternatives. Those promoting ranching as a means of preserving open space are actually fiddling while Rome burns.

Tim: Is public lands ranching dying a natural death and, if so, what can we do to help it along?

George: Yes it is dying—I would say the industry is already comatose and that is one reason why a strategy aimed at "preserving ranching" as a way to protect open space is both naive and ultimately doomed to failure.

Rising land prices around the West have effectively killed the western livestock industry. You can't buy land at today's prices and pay it off running cattle. That means that no young people can enter the business—unless they have outside money. That has several effects. Old ranchers as they retire are not being replaced. Secondly, it also makes it more difficult to pass on a ranch to family members. Even small ranches are now worth millions of dollars.

You are left without much choice but to sell it. In some places this means subdividing it. In other areas it means selling to some wealthy individual who runs the ranch as a "trophy" or "hobby." That is not all together a bad fate, since it keeps the land intact, but if you are rich you don't need to run cows.

I think there are several ways to hasten ranching's death. First, continued pressure on ranchers, particularly public lands ranchers, makes it less fun to be into ranching. For the wealthy and elite that are coming to dominate the western livestock business, making it less prestigious to be a rancher could effectively change the status of this occupation. It is somewhat like making it less desirable to be a slave owner. Once this is no longer socially acceptable, far fewer wealthy individuals will run cows on their lands. They might seek status in a different way—restoring ecosystems—as Ted Turner has done. We should try to shape the debate so that ecosystem restoration is what the wealthy do—not run cows.

Two weeks later, according to Reuters, Norway's Foreign Minister Thorbjoern Jagland was in for a surprise when protesters threw a cream pie in his face. He light-heartedly cleaned himself up and proceeded to lead a labor march in Oslo. This was the fifth Scandinavian pie action in two months.

Pie-wielding Forest Defender Sentenced to Six Months in Prison

Salmon Soufflè Society pie-thrower Randall Mark soufflèd US Senator Helen Chenowith in Idaho last September. Because he was on probation from a previous protest against logging, and because Idaho is such a reactionary state, he was sentenced to a six-month sentence. He is scheduled to be released in early June.

Armitage Yoked in Seoul

South Korean protesters threw raw eggs at US Deputy Secretary of State Richard Armitage on May 9, as he was driven from his hotel for a round of meetings with South Korean cabinet ministers. At least six activists were arrested after pelting Armitage's car with eggs as he was driving out of the Grand Hyatt Hotel following breakfast.

"We're not happy with this coming to Korea," said the Reverend Mun Jeonghyun, a leader of a group that objects to US plans for a global missile defense system. "He's trying to force Korea to accept the missile defense," Mun said.

Pissed Prescott Punches Protester

On May 16, British Deputy Prime Minister John Prescott was attacked and wrestled to the ground after punching an egg-throwing demonstrator in Wales. The Deputy Minister, the political equivalent of an American Vice President, lashed out in response to being hit in the face by an

egg thrown at close range from an angry crowd. The ugly fracas capped a day in which the launch of a Labour Party manifesto was overshadowed by a series of episodes in which senior politicians from all parties faced public abuse and hostility.

A man hurled the egg as Prescott passed him. Television pictures showed Prescott turning and jabbing out at the man with his left hand. The man then lunged at Prescott across a crowdcontrol barrier, and the pair became locked in a struggle in which Prescott was pinned to the ground. The Deputy Prime Minister was then hustled inside, egg dripping from his face and jacket.

The local Conservative candidate promptly called for him to resign, saying, "What sort of role model is he for young people? Throwing eggs is almost a time-honoured tradition in this country. It might hurt and sting your face a bit, but it doesn't harm you. If politicians can't put up with things like that they shouldn't be in the job."

In 1997, the anarchist pop band Chumbawamba dumped a bucket of ice water on Prescott at the British Music Awards, an incident he described as "deplorable, utterly contemptible."

Slick Willie Enjoys a Sticky

On May 17, the day after the Prescott incident, Former President Bill Clinton was jeered by anti-globalization protesters and attacked by an egg-throwing anarchist while visiting Poland's capital as part of a European speaking tour. The egg struck Clinton's sleeve as he walked through Warsaw's Old Town district.

According to reports, Clinton said in response to the attack that "it's good for young people to be angry about something."

Environmental News of the Weird

Snake Gets Revenge on Drunk

A snake being tormented by a drunk in an Australian coastal resort on May 9, responded by almost choking the man to death.

Police said a 39-year-old man was wandering about the town of Byron Bay with a six foot python, which he used to harass passersby before repeatedly hurling the snake against a wall.

Two police officers arrived to find the man, clearly a little the worse for wear, had retrieved his companion and was parading with it around his shoulders. The reptile's patience, however, was at an end, and it decided to reassert itself by choking its handler.

The man gasped for air and "fell face first into the concrete." The police at the scene used their batons to unwind the snake from around the man's throat.

The man was treated later by an ambulance crew and allowed to sleep off his big night in jail. As a reward for apprehending a drunk, the snake was released into the wild.

McVeigh on the Vegan Diet

Oklahoma City bomber Timothy McVeigh, asked by People For the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA) to drop animal products from his diet, says he understands the cause but doesn't fully support it.

In a response to PETA, McVeigh also wrote, "I cannot sustain a prolonged intellectual debate on the subject as my time is short, but I suggest hitting Ted Kaczynski up for his opinions on the subject."

McVeigh even provided the prison address for Kaczynski, the Unabomber. The two were held in

the same prison in Florence, Colorado, before McVeigh was moved to death row at the U.S. Penitentiary in Terre Haute, Indiana.

In the letter to Bruce Friedrich, PETA's vegan campaign coordinator, McVeigh wrote, "Truth is, I understand your cause-

I've seen slaughterhouses myself-but I still believe in reasonable taking and eating of game (as an outdoorsman and hunter)."

McVeigh went on to raise questions about where people in "the veg movement" draw the line. "Where do those who oppose suffering stand?" McVeigh wrote. "(Ever see a fish struggling out of water?) What about grubs/worms/etc.?"

McVeigh, convicted of killing 168 people by bombing the Oklahoma City federal building in 1995, also noted that plants are alive and respond to stimuli, just as an animal would respond to pain.

"To me, the answer is as the Indians believed: Respect the life you take to sustain yourself, but come to terms with your place in the 'food chain'," McVeigh wrote.

Elephants Drive Villagers into Trees

Rampaging elephants lured by the smell of homemade liquor have forced nearly 24 tribespeople to sleep in treetops in the eastern Indian state of Orissa, an official said.

Some 60 elephants are running amok in the area, damaging mud houses as they try to sniff out the alcohol.

"Close to two dozen people are staying in the treetops with family members because they are afraid of the elephants. They often take their bedding and food (with them) during the night," a local said. "At least six people have died in the past 18 months in elephant attacks in the area and 200 houses have been damaged or destroyed."

The elephants have been drawn to the area, 220 km (137 miles) from the state capital of Bhubaneshwar, by the smell of handia, a local brew made out of fermented rice.

Earth Day with Ayn Rand's People

If you were looking for the Ayn Rand Institute (ARI) to throw a big Earth Day bash, you can forget about it.

"Earth Day should be a celebration of the achievements of industry and technology, not of their destruction. It's a myth that the environmentalists are saving the Earth for manthey actually see human beings as the enemies of nature," said Dr. Andrew Bernstein, a senior writer for the institute. "Earth Day should be the occasion for celebrating the Earth as a great value, not in and of itself, but only as a means to achieve human values."

Bernstein said Earth Day 2001's theme of "Leave your car at home" expresses the environmentalists' fundamental contempt for industrial society, progress and human values. "Without automobiles there would be little commerce, communication or freedom," he said. "The goal of the environmentalists is to see man crawling back to the cave."

ARI cooperated with the Virginia-based Center for the Moral Defense of Capitalism in a national campaign to protest Earth Day as anti-human life and to celebrate the benefits to man of developing the Earth. This joint effort climaxed with a small demonstration at the Washington Monument on Earth Day.

This is What Democracy Looks Like

Protesters around the world celebrate May Day by filling the streets of cities. However, for as little as \$100, an American business called www.whitehouseprotests.com will hold a 3 foot by 10 foot banner in front of the White House for an hour and send you a photo of it. A promotional statement asserts that, "Those who make peaceful demonstration possible will make violent revolution inconceivable." How true that is.

"Our view is that [Interior Secretary Gail Norton] is James Watt in a skirt," said Allen Mattison, the national spokesperson for the Sierra Club.

A campaign that saves 6,000 acres of ancient forest from clearcutting is a precious wonder. That such a campaign mixes direct action with strong rural organizing in a timber town is miraculous. When such a campaign is captured on film, available to you as a 66-minute organizing tool for \$15, it sounds too good to be true. As if that were not enough, in the maledominated world of video production this excellent work comes from first-time director/producer Briana Waters. Watch! The campaign to save Watch Mountain and Fossil Creek in southern Washington is set in the end game of the I-90 land exchange, summer of 1999. Losing means the land would leave public "ownership" and be rapidly destroyed. The villains include Slade Gorton, Patty Murray, Sierra Club Checkerboard Project and Plum Creek Timber Company. The coalition for the Earth is a mix of down-home folks in the prime of life and a set of young treesitters, new and old.

We get to meet a wide variety of characters rarely seen in activist

video. When the folks of Randle, Washington call it like they see it, corporate media spin falls apart and the "jobs vs. the Earth" argument vanishes before our eyes. The heart and soul of *Watch* are these interviews with townsfolk who don't want their mountain clearcut and are fed up with timber industry landslides. As soon as the way is clear for their voices to be heard, rural folks who love the Earth come out in droves to speak the truth and stand for the land.

Meanwhile, up on the mountain, viewers are treated to a sense of both the thrill and tranquility of a summer in the treetops. In the city, activists take it to corporate headquarters in a decisive action days before Plum Creek screamed "uncle." All of this action takes place in a context of Native rights to the land that transcend government, corporate claims and activist visions.

But far from a sugar-coating, Briana opens with a challenge to the whole notion of video in Earth-activism. And the victory itself is examined for the underlying meaning of a government buyout that leaves more money in corporate hands.

If you have ever enjoyed an activist video or ever spent a night in a tree, you will want to get your hands on a copy of *Watch*. If a friend or family member still doesn't understand why you work for the Earth or what direct action is, this may be your answer. After all, if its one thing Americans do well it is watching TV. So let's get them to spend an evening watching *Watch*.

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The Story Behind and Beyond the WTO Demonstrations

If you were there, you will definitely want to read it. And if you plan on protesting corporate globalization at any time in the future, Janet Thomas' book, *The Battle in Seattle: The Story Behind and Beyond the WTO Demonstrations* is required

reading. Through the stories of people who made it happen, Thomas weaves together the multifaceted strands that created what is now considered a benchmark event in the history of citizen protest. By giving voice to the diverse causes compelled to converge and challenge the soulless brutality of corporate domination, she presents a readable, comprehensible pathway through the labyrinth of global politics and realities. The book serves not only as a document of the Seattle protest but also as a valuable reference and an inspiration to continued resistance.

I was born in Seattle. Like the author I now live on San Juan Island. The landscape of this book was familiar to me and brought home the old adage "Think globally, act locally." As familiar with the territory as I am, reading *The Battle in Seattle* taught me many things I did not know. Thomas takes her readers back to a 1944 meeting in New Hampshire at Bretton Woods that sets the stage for our current global eco-

nomic situation, then she brings us up to date with the critical issue of today's third world debt.

In the Fall of 1999, the microcosm and the macrocosm intersected in our backyard. New York filmmaker Shaya Mercer who directed the fulllength documentary *Trade-Off* that premiered at the Seattle International Film Festival in June 2000, grew up here on San Juan Island. Ben White who came up with the idea for the sea turtle action and organized the construction of 250 sea turtle costumes (one of which is now in the Smithsonian museum) lives just down the road. And the organic farmers that Thomas went to interview in the Cascade Mounevent, yet it also serves as a tool for activists by showing the relationships between a broad scope of issues. Farming, labor, third world debt, animal rights, environmental issues and issues of sovereignty come together as mutually dependent forces in resisting corporate control. The scope of the issues make it impossible to

cover any one area in great depth, so for further exploration nearly 200 organizations are listed at the back of the book with addresses, phone numbers and websites. Organizational contacts are followed by an informed list of suggested reading materials.

Not only does this book bring the problems into focus, but solutions are suggested as well. Interviewee, Dr. Michael Cohen, founder of the Gaia Conference and recipient of the UN's Distinguished World Citizen award. teaches his students "to forget what we've learned and get intimate with what we know." Says Cohen, "Power will prevail, but it will be the power of natural attraction: a state of inherent grace, in which we fit into the web of life and keep our inherent sensory awareness well tuned for the occasion."

Standing up to the might and muscle of global corporate power is a daunting

challenge. Even understanding the complexity of the issues can be intimidating. Here is a tool that offers clarity and connection, information and inspiration. I highly recommend adding this one to your bookshelf or your backpack.

Protect Medicine Lake from Geothermal Development

Recently a stay against construction at Medicine Lake in Northern California was lifted, giving CalPine Corporation the green light to begin drilling test wells. The Medicine Lake Highlands are held sacred by every tribe in the area including the Pit River, Modoc and Shasta people. Exploitation of the geothermal power under the mountains would destroy ancient traditions of healing and worship and poison this pristine aquifer, one of the main sources of the Sacramento River. Drilling could begin at any time, even as the project is being challenged in court.

A 7.5-minute organizing video about proposed geothermal development at Medicine Lake is now available.
